## Nurses Will Discuss Collective Bargaining

The controversial Nurses Collective Bargaining Act is expected to be the main topic of discussion at a general meeting of the Halton County Registered Nurses Association in Milton, April 7th.

The legislation supported by most members of the RNA requires the employer to recognize the organization as bargaining agent when he is requested in writing by the majority of full time nurses in his employ.

The meeting will be held at the School for the Deaf beginning at 7:30.

The evening will begin with a tour of the school followed by a general business meeting.

There were 772 pupils in Canada's 32 schools for the blind and 3,561 pupils in 10 schools for the deaf in the 1963-64 school year.

Ken Truodridge, principal of Brookville school, Naasagawaya, was chairman and Writtleworth principal William Kinrade served as timekeeper. John Munton extended greetings from Georgetown public school board.

## Won't Convict Without Pre-Sentence Reports

Magistrate Kenneth M. Langdon, Georgetown, ordered pre-sentence reports for two of four youths tried for theft without registering conviction last Monday. The magistrate has had a run-in with the Ontario Probation Director's Department because he refused to convict before asking for reports in previous cases.

The department has instructed its probation officers in Halton not to prepare the reports until convictions are registered in an attempt to foil the local magistrate's method of dealing with young people appearing before him.

Magistrate Langdon says he refuses to "saddle" youths with criminal records unless he has the benefit of pre-sentence reports.

Four youths charged with stealing assorted items from a farmer's garage in Yaqusung township were released in their own custody.

## Coulter, Masson Seek Federal P-C Nomination

The Federal Nomination Meeting of the Halton Progressive Conservative Association will hear Gordon Fairweather M.P. for the Royal Riding of New Brunswick. The meeting is scheduled for the Williams Street High School in Milton on Friday, April 23.

Mr. Fairweather is a former Cabinet Minister in New Brunswick, having been appointed in 1958 Attorney-General at age 35, the youngest in the history of New Brunswick. He moved to the Federal Parliament in 1962 and has been a leading spokesman for the Conservative Party during the last session.

So far, two candidates have declared themselves in the race for the nomination, Reeve Williams Coulter of Naasagawaya Township and Mayor Allan Masson of Oakville, are expected to be joined by at least two others seeking the nomination.

A total of 736 delegates from the seven municipalities in Halton riding will be eligible to vote for the Progressive Conservative nominee at the next Federal Election.

Despite denials by the Liberal Government in Ottawa, party officials expect that there will be a Federal Election this summer or early fall.


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
