Georgetown Missing From Fastball Entries

Georgetown, a logical entry in the newly formed Suburban Fastball League, is still not represented in the new loop and nobody seems to know why.
The Suburban League as it stands now is a five-team circuit with Acton, Milton, Glen Williams, Hornby-Osange, and Hillsburgh committed.
Georgetown is teetering on the brink of being the sixth member but for some reason, the league organizers can't get a representative to step forward and throw this town's cap in the ring.

Eighteen players may be signed by each participating team and the certificates for each player must be given the league secretary by the seventh game of the schedule.

The four top teams at the end of the regular schedule will take part in the league playoffs. Representatives from each team have priority over ORSA and OASA playoffs.
Rainouts will be played within ten days after the schedule game date.
