

TWO GEORGETOWN HOCKEY TEAMS IN ONTARIO FINALS

Bowmanville Big Hurdle For Pee-wee Wonder Team

In a display of determination and courage that bore out the confidence of their backers, Georgetown Pee Wees swept to a 7-0 triumph over the powerful Leamington club to gain the Ontario Pee Wee finals for the first time in history.

Down 4 goals in the two-game total goals series after a 6-2 defeat in Leamington last weekend, the Georgetown team surged immediately to eliminate the deficit by the middle of the second period.

The win gave Georgetown Pee Wees the round 8 goals to 7.

The win ended Leamington's three year domination of Pee Wee Competition in the province.

The Leamington club earned the Ontario honours in 1962, 1963 and 1964.

After Georgetown's 6-2 setback in the first game coach Mike Inglis said he refused to believe the champs were the better club and his enthusiasm was mirrored in his players Sunday.

The last hurdle for the title-bound Pee Wees is presented by Bowmanville who host the locals in the first game of the best of five series Wednesday April 7.

The first home game will be tomorrow (Friday) night starting at 8 o'clock.

Bowmanville won the toss of the coin to get the extra game if needed. The third match is scheduled for Monday April 13 in Bowmanville and the other games if necessary will be Sunday April 18 here, and Monday April 19 in Bowmanville.

Neil Korzack scored four times to spearhead the local assault. Fendley netted a pair and the other goal was notched by Inglis.

Inglis' marker from Korzack opened the scoring at 4:27. Fendley was next to bulge the Leamington twins scoring from Korzack and Fogal at 13:20 and Leamington had reduced the Georgetown advantage to 2 goals by the end of the first period.

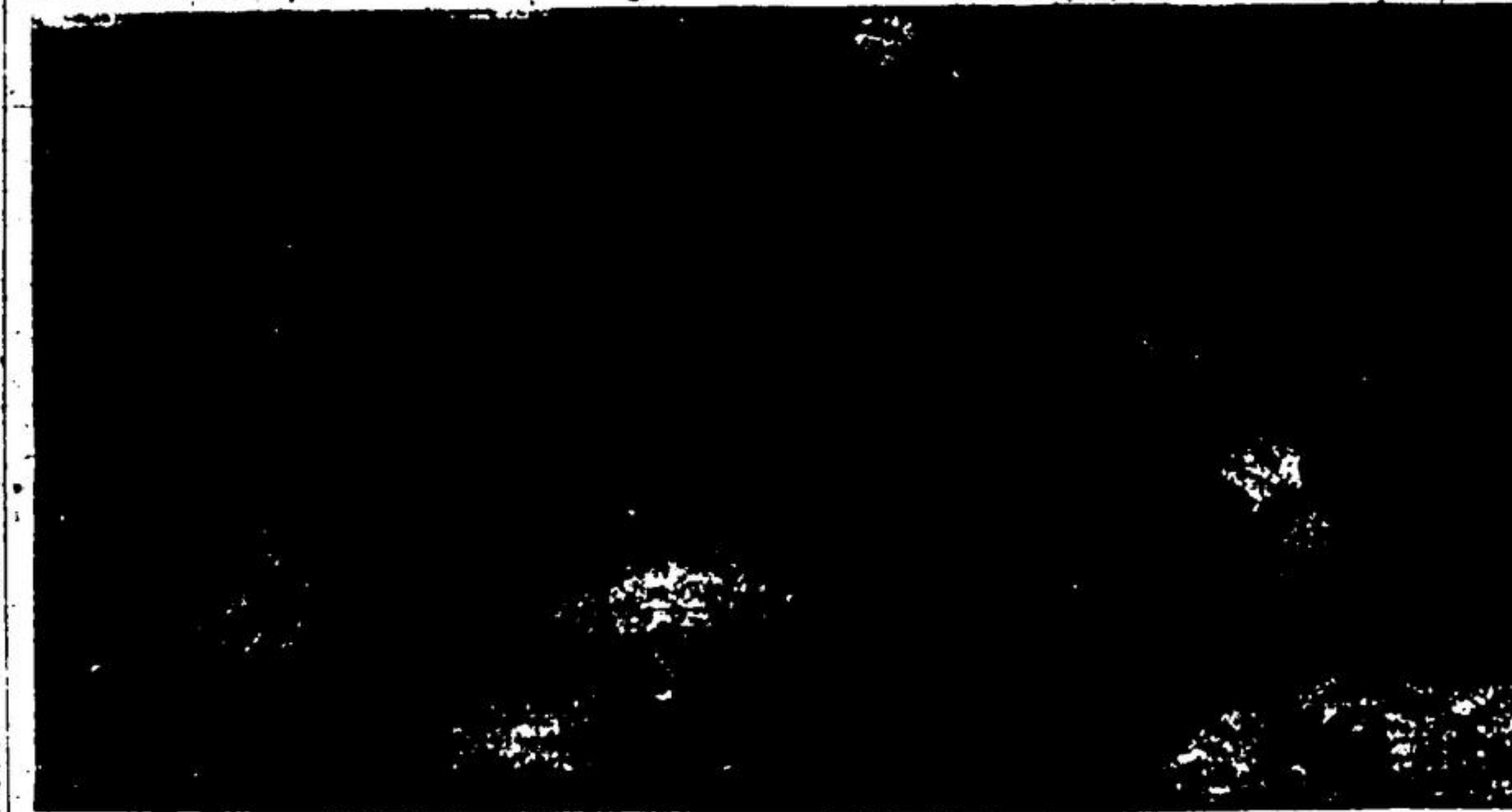
Korzack scored the hat-trick to handle all the second period scoring. His first at 2:27 was from Gerry Neil, the next at 8:45 was from Foster and Hillock and his third, and Georgetown's fifth, was at 19:55 from Fendley.

That one with 5 seconds left in the second period gave Georgetown a 7-8 lead in the round.

Korzack scored his fourth goal in a row at 7:20 of the third period from Foster and Llewellyn to give Georgetown some breathing room.

Fendley punched in his second goal to extend it to 9-6, and complete the 7-0 rout with assistance from Neil and Heppes at 18:20.

Midgets Face Cobourg In Title Defence

Georgetown Midgets will be around when the Ontario Midget A Championship is decided again this year.

The Georgetown club, title-lists for the past two seasons, moved into position for a third straight crown Sunday by thumping Leamington Midgets 5-1 in the second game of a two-game home and home semi-final in Georgetown Memorial Arena.

The champs blanked Leamington 1-0 in the first game in vegetable volatility and so chalked up a 6-1 triumph on the round.

The last challenge for the title will come from Cobourg in a best 3 of 5 series to start Wednesday April 7 in Cobourg. The first home game will be Sunday April 11 in the Memorial Arena at 2:30.

Georgetown downed Cobourg to retain the championship they gained by dumping Orillia the year before.

Leamington and Georgetown went scoreless through the first period Sunday. The locals took a 2-1 edge into the third and took complete control in the late stages for the convincing win.

Keith Pascook passed to Allen Stuttard for the goal that snapped the 0-0 deadlock at 5:31 of the middle frame.

Leamington's Bill Wright erased the edge with his goal at 7:00, but Georgetown had the lead back in a matter of seconds. Gerald Moody scored the go-ahead marker at 7:56 from Bill Dwyer and Paul Robinson and Georgetown just built off their advantage from that point.

John Quackenbush boosted to 27 from Dwyer and Henry King at 5:33 of the third period.

King converted Larry Bradley's pass into Georgetown's 4th goal at 11:40, and 43 seconds later Paul Robinson capped the locals' scoring with his marker from Quackenbush and Inglis.

Georgetown's Gerald Moody set out most of the last half of the third period in the penalty box with a misconduct sentence. His ten minutes made Georgetown's penalties total 34 minutes to Leamington's 18 minutes.

Georgetown won the toss to get the extra home game in the finals schedule. The third game is set for Georgetown in a 2-1 edge into the third and game, if necessary, will be at Cobourg Saturday April 17, and the fifth game, if necessary, will be back here Sunday April 18.

The Georgetown Midgets are coached by Gerry Inglis.
