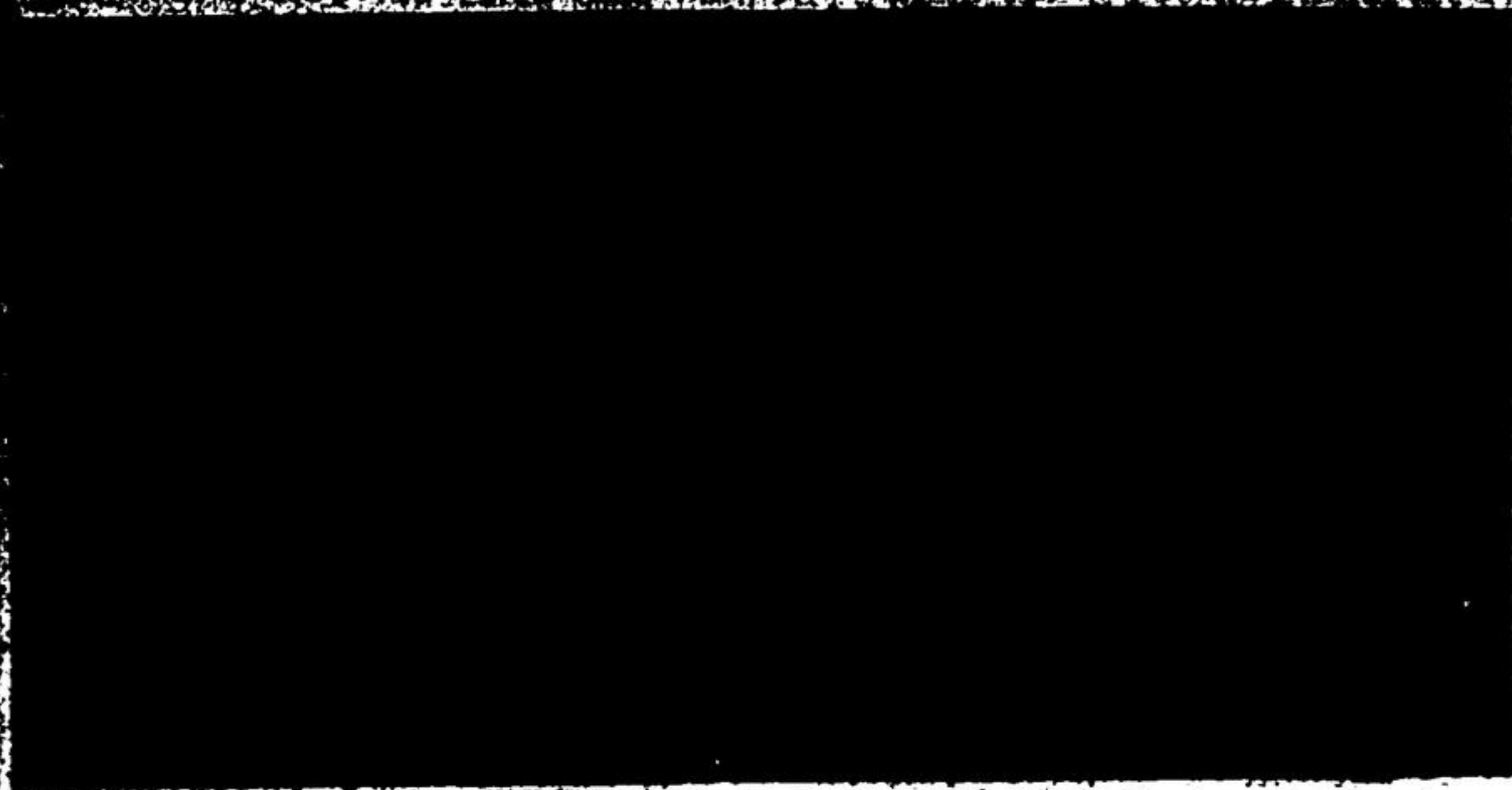
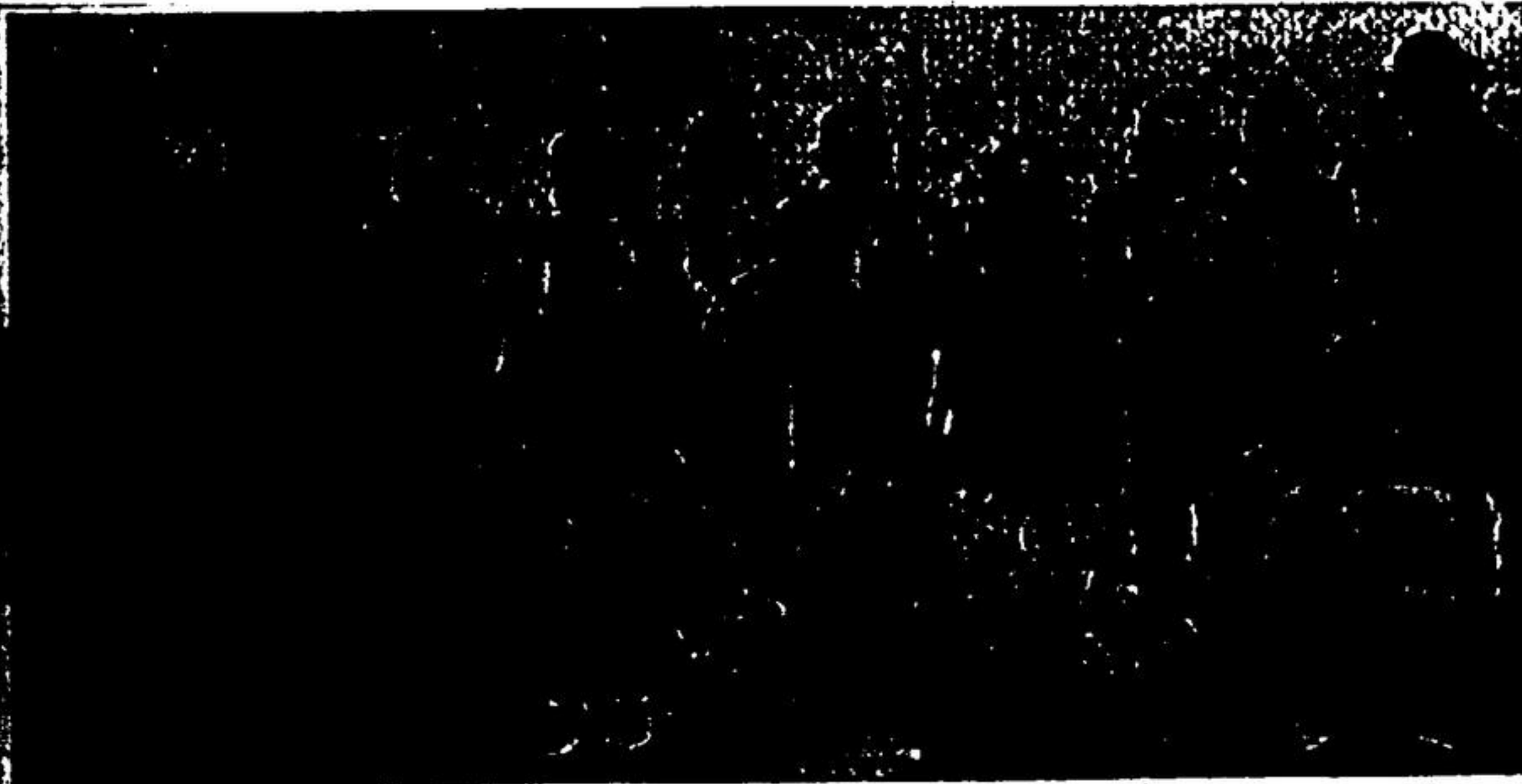

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The 2 teams put on a good show to end up deadlocked at 3-3.

Wants Regional Unit In Halton For Best Results

Dr. R. R. Krueger, a geography professor at the University of Waterloo, urged Halton County be made into a "regional planning unit" to prevent haphazard expansion.

Speaking to the Milton University Women's Institute, Professor Krueger stated the unchecked growth of Metropolitan Toronto will engulf the county and bring it problems of an unplanned community.

Orderly growth can be had if the residents of the county "band together" to form a regional planning unit he said.

CONTROL EXPANSION

The professor said the expansion might not be stopped but it can be controlled.

"Individual municipalities such as Georgetown, Milton, Acton and Oakville are going to be powerless to control the development if they continue to work independently of one another," Dr. Krueger noted.

County warden, Herb Merry, two months ago, made a similar proposal when he suggested a Metro-type government be set up in Halton.

"LOPPED OFF"

The warden fears parts of the county will be lopped off by sprawling Metropolitan Toronto or greater Hamilton.

Professor Krueger also stated existing county boundaries are outmoded. They don't conform to the reality of present economic and development patterns, he explained.

Since being established, in 1849 the boundaries have never been adjusted to meet the needs of fast-growing urban centres, he added.
