LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

There are two basic types of defense — a passive defense and an active defense. In a passive defense you should play cautiously and not give anything away. In an active defense, you must try anything and perhaps take some chances.

When you are defending a hand, you should decide upon your type of defense you are using. The often, declarer will make a hand because the defender has active when they should have been passive or vice versa.

How can you tell which type? Only experience will tell, but there are a few indications. Here is a hand to illustrate what I mean.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

But I claim that South should not make four spades. West leads the diamond ace and captures the discouraging three from East. West leads at his three hearts in the hand, and of dummy's heart to the ace, queen, jack.

Well, now that things are going to work well for declarer if he does not do something. West must not win. A spade lead is out, a heart lead is possible, a diamond lead does nothing. West must lead the king. This leaves only the club suit to be considered. West must win the king of clubs. To relieve partner of any problems, West should lead the queen of clubs.

This lead will give the defense four tricks. When West retains the lead with the trump king, a club lead will not win twice there.

Nursing Group Tours School for the Deaf

Approximately seventy nurses attended a very informative meeting held by the Halton County Chapter, Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario, at the Ontario School for the Deaf at Milton Ontario.

The meeting was opened with a tour of the school, followed by a talk given by Mr. D. E. Kennedy, Superintendent. Mr. Kennedy explained that the present enrollment is two hundred and ten children from five to fourteen years of age.

Twenty-five classrooms are used for both resident and non-resident pupils. Academic and vocational classrooms are now under construction for an additional three hundred and twenty senior students up to twenty-one years old. It was obvious to all that no deaf child with sufficient learning ability need lack a good education in Ontario.

Served as Toronto Policeman 32 Years

A member of the Toronto police force for 32 years, Geo. L. Couling, 68, died suddenly in Georgetown Hospital, April 1.
