David Blaney spoke for the Scouts, explaining the qualifications needed to attain the certificate and stressing that service is the keyword which guides a Scout in his daily life.

The official party, piped in by Virginia Walker and Valerie Kitchen of Georgetown Girls Pipe Band, included Lt. Col. R. G. Hardie, Lance Scott C. O., Rev. J. H. McMurra, president of Georgetown's Ministerial association, Walter Pope, president of Georgetown District Scout Council and Victor Gunn, district commissioner.

Douglas Hancock, South Waterloo commissioner, presented the Scouts to the Lieutenant-governor, with Field executive commissioner Dennis Lewis assisting. Commissioner Walter Hatch was chairman. Organ music was provided by Paul Barber.
