

# Lieutenant Governor Presents Queen's Scout Parchments

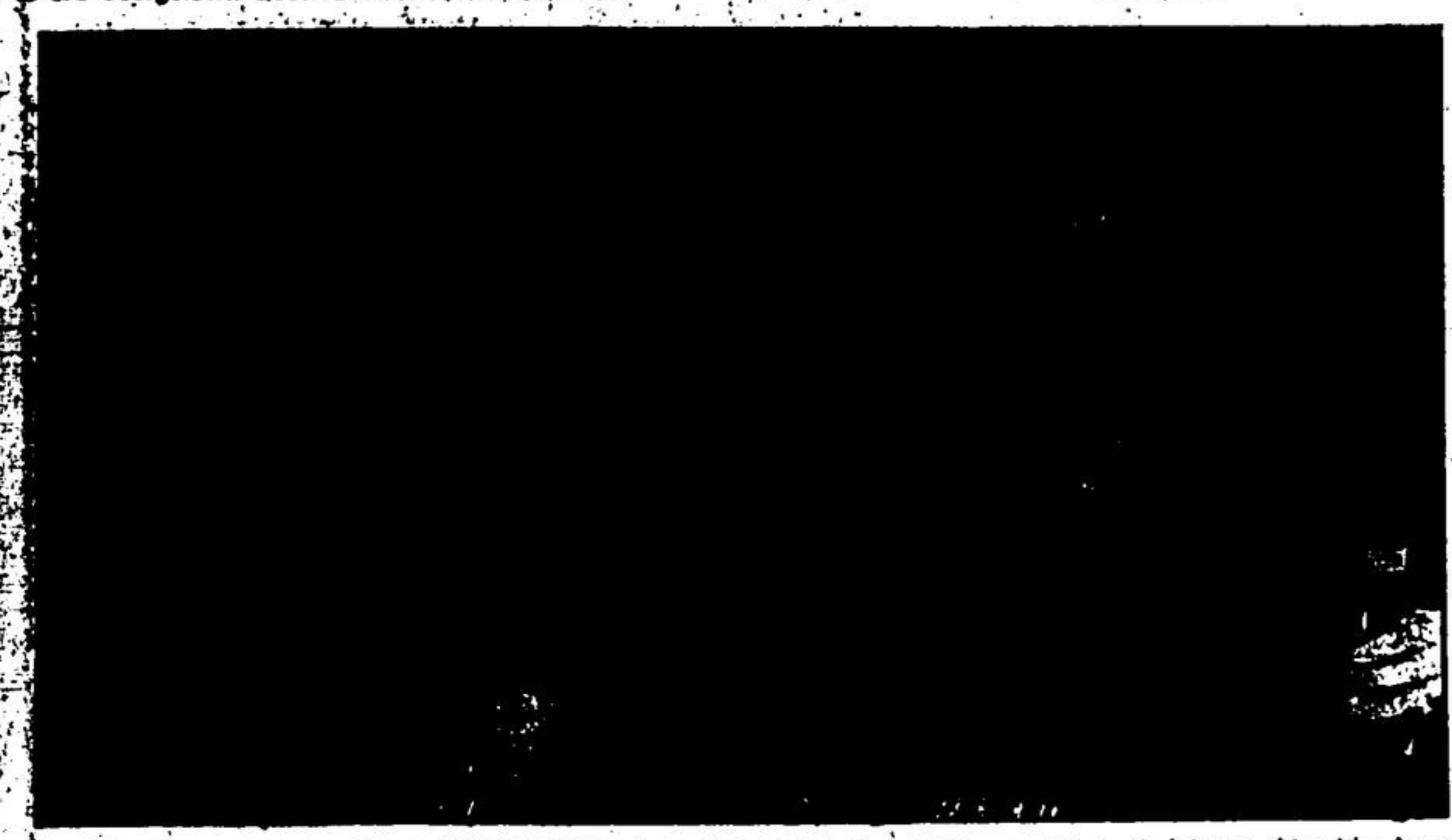
The Georgetown Scouts received their Queen's Scout certificates Friday from Ontario's Lieutenant Governor, His Honour W. Earl Rowe.

They were among 150 scouts from Green Acres Region to get the coveted award, highest in Scouting.

The high school auditorium was jam-packed for the night. Green Acres takes in such communities as Hazelton, Kitchener, Guelph and Stratford as well as the neighbouring towns of Burlington, Oakville and Milton.

Scouts and Scoutmasters paraded in the platform individually where they were greeted by Mr. Rowe. "The older I grow, the more I appreciate young people," Mr. Rowe told his audience. "We are clamoring for leadership today, not only in government but in all fields of life. Training as a Queen's Scout is an excellent starting point in a young man's training."

David Blaney spoke for the Scouts, explaining the qualifications needed to attain the certificate and stressing that service is the keyword which guides a Scout in his daily life.

The official party, piped in by Virginia Walker and Valerie Kitchen of Georgetown Girls Pipe Band, included Lt. Col. R. G. Hardie, Lorne Scott, C. O., Rev. J. H. McMillan, president of Georgetown's Ministerial Association, Walter Pope, president of Georgetown District Scout Council and Victor Gunn, district commissioner.

Douglas Hancock, South Western commissioner, presented the Scouts to the Lieutenant Governor, with field executive commissioner Dennis Lewis assisting. Commissioner Walter Hatch was chairman. Organ music was provided by Paul Barber.

A touching part of the ceremony was presentation of certificates to E. P. Raymond Applewood, whose son was killed in a car accident only a few weeks before he would have received his award. A minute of silence was followed by the last Post, sounded by Jim Fiddler of Georgetown Band.

Scouts, their parents and friends were feted afterwards at a social hour in the school cafeteria.

## Chinguacousy Police Sign New Contract

Chinguacousy Police Association has signed a two-year contract with its police commission. This will give all ranks with the exception of probationary and third class constables, a \$300 increase for 1965.

The Chinguacousy Department police R.E. 4, Georgetown, part of Norval and Terra Cottis in this area.

The probationary and third class officers will receive a \$250 increase this year. However, in the second year of the two-year contract, the increase will be \$350 across the board.

Constable Douglas Budden, president of the Police Association this year and a member of the negotiating committee to gether with Constable Stanley Martin, Association secretary, said this morning the signing came at the end of a very good meeting, which lasted about 45 minutes. Partial agreement was achieved at the previous meeting, with negotiations to continue on two points, one of which was wages. In the interval there had been a meeting with the reeve and the township.

Under the terms of the new agreement, probationary officers will start at \$4,450, and in 1965 the starting rate will be \$4,800. "A year ago" said Constable Budden, "the starting rate was \$3,600."

The new contract also makes provision for compensation for any overtime and court time expended by an officer who is on his "off time". Constable Budden explained that any accumulation of overtime, at the end of each three-month period that has not been used up, will be paid to the man concerned in cash.

Service pay provisions are also included in the new contract to the extent that after five full years of service, an allowance of \$5 per month will be paid, for sergeants down. Officers will also be paid for 11 statutory holidays as set up by the township.

Under the terms of the new agreement, first class constables on the Chinguacousy force will get \$5,900 this year, and in the second year, 1965, will receive \$6,250.

The association has decided to keep the jackpot at \$1,000 despite the win and the big prize will still be available for another lucky person.
