If Dog Threatens, Then Mail Doesn't Go Through

"The Postman Always Rings Twice," they say, but in some areas that may not be true. In some areas, the postman may not even get to the door.

However, one little snarling, threatening canine can make the postman ring not once, nor the mail go through at all.

According to Postmaster Harold Marshall, the postmen are instructed to walk right past the house with the threatening dog and bring the mail back to the post office. The owners are then phoned and asked to tie up the dog or pick up their mail at the post office.

"We always get the utmost co-operation," says the postmaster, "and never have had to call the same person twice."

Despite the image of the comic strips which have dogs biting postmen as a regular diet, approximately four bites per year among the six town postmen is about normal.

While admitting dogs are a continuing hazard, the postmaster praised Georgetown's dog control system which he felt had largely eliminated the danger.

Claims that a dog repellent had reduced bites by 40 percent in the States, were received sceptically by Mr. Marshall. "I've heard of and I saw one demonstrated on T.V. but they evaporate too fast," he opined. As far as he knew no postoffice departments in Canada are using them.

According to the experts, who claim to know what a dog thinks, it is the pack on the postman's back which annoys them. This evidently sets them apart from other people. Supporting their view, they point out that other delivery men are not attacked as frequently as postmen.

Now if the same "experts" would only tell the postmen how to read the dog's mind the problem would be solved.
