

Retain the Old Name O.D.E. Delegates Plead

Members of the O.D.E. Chapter in Georgetown, Ontario, have petitioned the National O.D.E. Council to retain the name of the Order of the Deacons of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Kingdom of God.

The petition was presented to the National Council at its 48th Annual Meeting in Toronto, Ontario, April 7, at the Sheraton Comenight Hotel, Hamilton.

The Georgetown Chapter was the first time in the history of the O.D.E. that a petition was presented to the National Council during the annual meeting.

The petition was signed by 100 members of the Georgetown Chapter and was presented to the National Council by Mrs. W. E. Morrison, Provincial President, and Mrs. G. E. Morrison, Provincial Secretary.

The National Council is expected to meet in Toronto, Ontario, in May, 1964.

Father Founded Textile Firm

Last surviving member of the family of a man who established one of the textile firms, William Thomas Beaumont, died in Georgetown hospital on April 2nd.

He was the son of Samuel Beaumont who, in 1878, established what is now the Beaumont Knitting Co. Ltd. in Glen Williams, Ontario, was born in Ontario and was only a young boy when the family moved to the Glen. He attended Glen Williams school, then worked in the family business.

He worked in lawrence and hockey when he was a young man and played on district teams. He was a lifelong member of St. Alban's Anglican Church which his family helped establish.

He leaves his wife, Agnes McGregor, seven children, Richard of St. Albans, John of Toronto, Mrs. Allan Braden (Jean) of Cooksville, Harp in western Canada, Edith, Isabel and Donald of Glen Williams; and eight grandchildren. A son, Flight Sergeant Lawrence Beaumont was killed in action over Germany in 1945. He was also predeceased by five brothers and two sisters.

Rev. Ronald Stibley conducted the funeral service in St. Alban's Church and interment was in Glen Williams Cemetery. Pallbearers were Delmar, Melvin, Brock and Junior Beaumont, Allan Braden and Andrew Fyfe, Toronto.
