## Kelly Keeps Cobourg Kicking Series Extended to the Limit

Playing their best hockey of the Ontario Midget A Minor final Cobourg Midgets made Georgetown Midgets put off their plans to cop the provincial crown in four games by dumping the locals 6-3 in front of a jubilant Cobourg crowd Saturday night.

A string of four straight Georgetown penalties at the tail end of the initial period enabled Cobourg to strike for three rapid-fire goals between 17:44 and the end of the period, enough to push the series to the limit.

Kelly, a strikeout in the opening game of the finals, which

was also captured by the Cobourg club, did all the first period damage.

Georgetown was abhorred again when the home team built the edge to four goals in the second period and then 8-0 before the end of the middle stanza.

## "Y" Judo Students in First Tournament Entry

The ancient Oriental skill, which every member of the Japanese army, navy, air force, and police force must learn—Judo—is becoming a very popular form of sport in Georgetown. Thanks to the auspices of the YMCA organization, and local facilities which are donated, boys are showing a keen interest in this fascinating skill.

Although the Judo Club has been operating for several years, Sunday, April 11 was their first chance to participate in a shial or tournament at Mr. V. Fagan's Kyu shin Judo Club in Toronto.

The tournament was governed by Olympic rules: classified by age and weight; three fights—no points for a win, 3 points for a loss, 3 points to each fighter for a draw, and each Judo or Judo player had four three minute fights with different opponents in his class at various times regardless of belt colour or Kyu.

The proficiency of a player is denoted by the colour of the sash or belt which he wears on his traditionally styled uniform. Junior belt classes are: beginner—Kyu—yellow, 4th Kyu—orange, 3rd Kyu—green, 2nd Kyu—blue, 1st Kyu—red and purple.

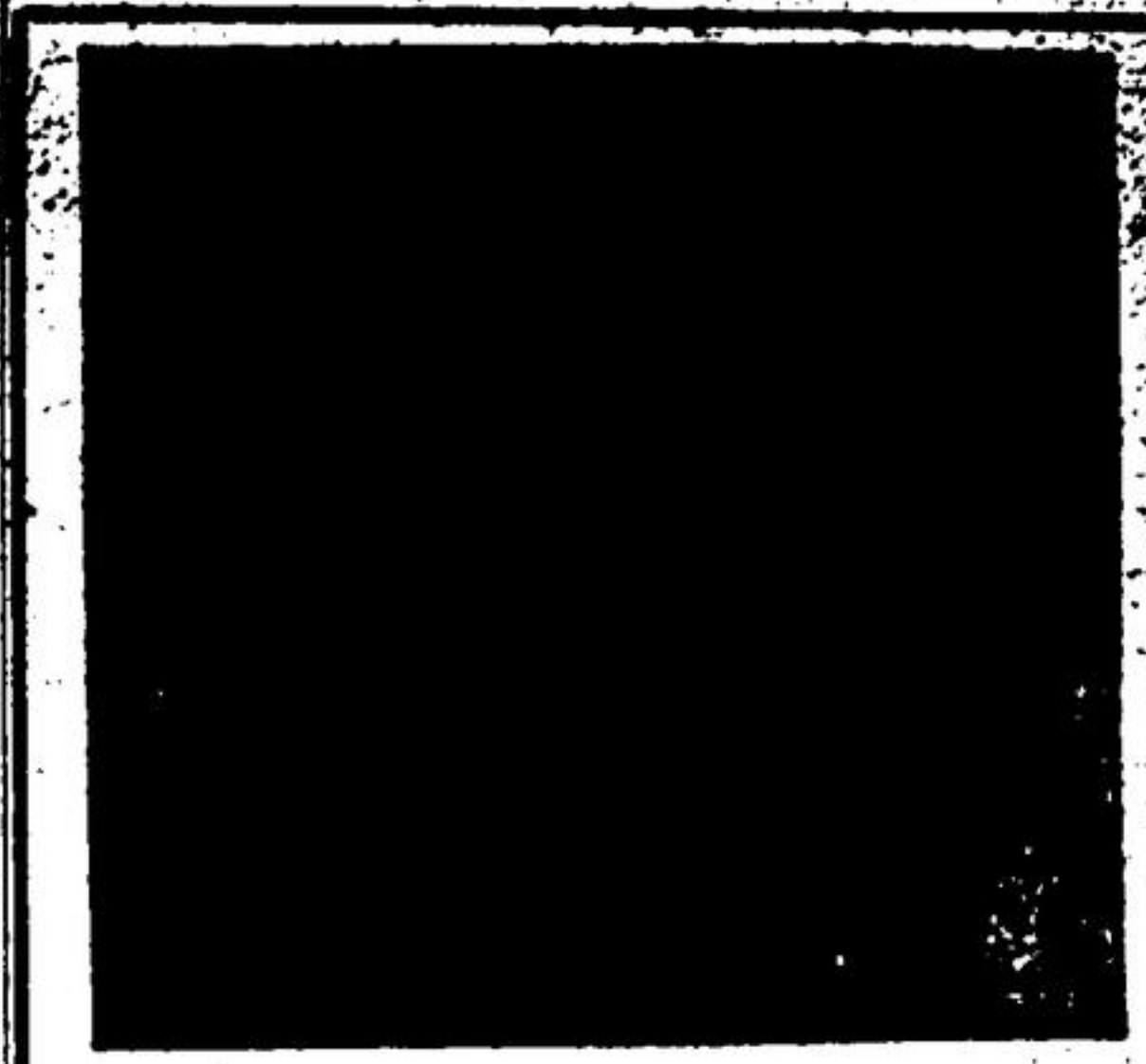
