If the student coming into Grade nine, has not definitely made up his mind upon a course, Mr. Prouse will usually advise them to take the arts and science, in that way all courses are still open to him. However, at the end of grade nine the final decision must be made, since after that, a change back to arts would result in the loss of at least one year.

In addition to actual courses offered, the Guidance Department tries to help with any problems which can baffle a child's progress, socially, academically or emotionally. While they avoid seeking any information of a private nature, they try to help the student adjust to the school, to the teachers, and the other students.

By a system of aptitude tests and observation of characteristics and ability, they try to point the way to a suitable goal.

In the words of the Guidance Branch of Department of Education, "the purpose of school guidance services is to help each student, first to understand his own talents and weaknesses, then to acquire skills, knowledge and attitudes that will best develop his talents, and finally to choose, train or enter and progress in an occupational field where he can find the greatest reward in personal satisfaction and the greatest opportunity to contribute to mankind the fruit of his talent."

His Busy Season

Guidance Dept. Director Has to Have the Answers



GUIDANCE DIRECTOR ALAN PROUSE

It's the busy season for the Guidance Department of the High School, and its Director Alan Prouse, as the school term nears its end, and Grade 8 and 9 students besiege him with questions regarding their future.

All through the year, of course, he acts as adviser and father-confessor for students of all grades but at this time it is mostly the younger ones who want the mysteries of High School courses explained.

"Mr. Prouse feels it is his duty to advise only, and insists the onus for the decision must lie with the student and the parent.

Quoting from an Ontario Department of Education circular, he says, "Although guidance services centre on school, and utilize the resources of the whole community, the responsibility for making the decisions regarding occupational choice and education planning must remain with the pupil and his parents."

This should help allay the fears of those parents who feel their freedom of choice may be in danger.

Mr. Prouse stresses that his main aim is to offer explanations, and explain the limitations of each course, so that no student finds the door closed to his chosen vocation simply through ignorance of the requirements.
