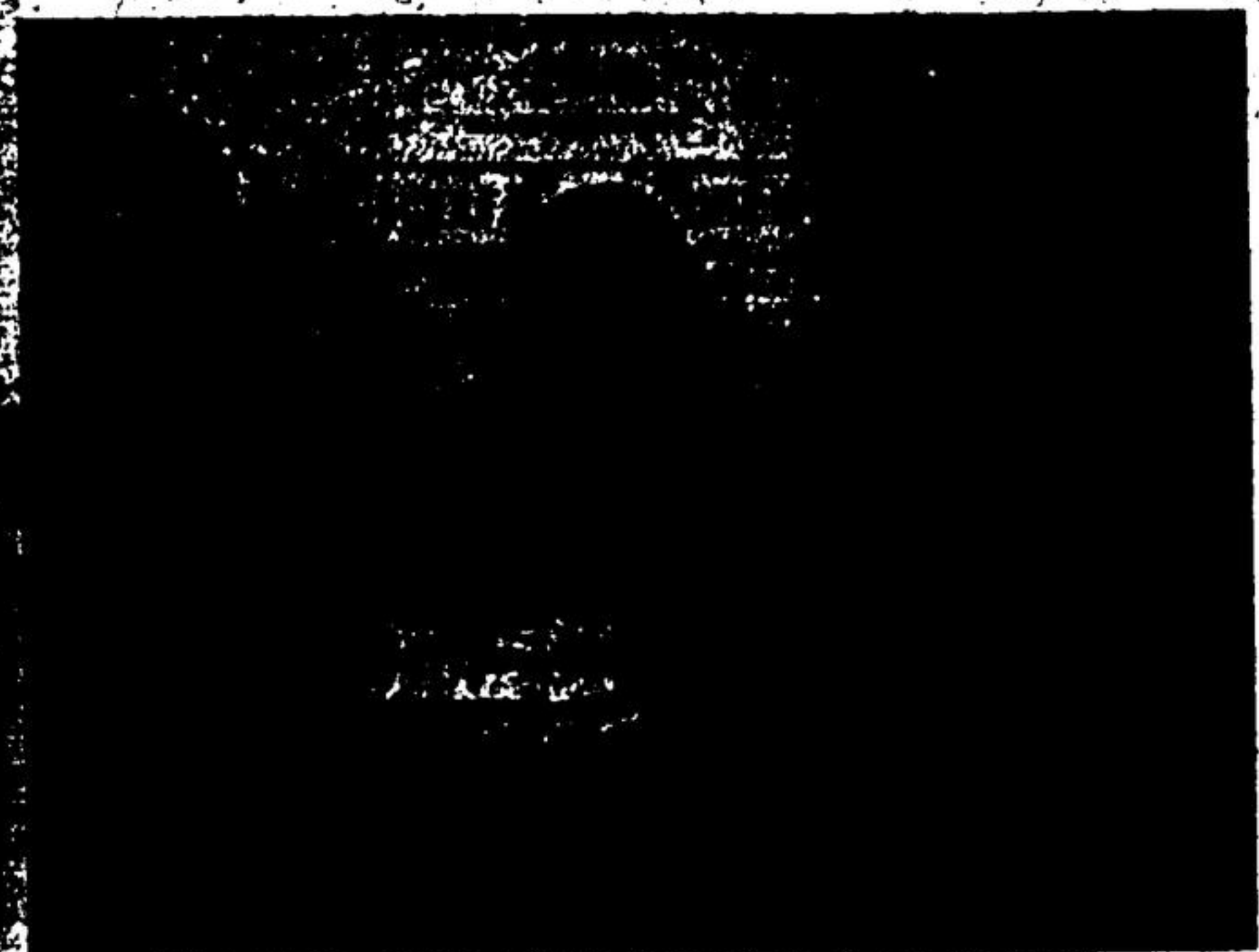
Last year under Mr. Broomhead's leadership the campaign went over the top and this year will attempt to do the same in the present campaign.

This year the budget for both Ontario and Georgetown combined is \$6,500, an increase of \$800 over last year.

Mr. Broomhead, who is president of the Ontario Division, was accompanied by Mrs. Leslie Clark, chairman of women's services, Mrs. M. Reid, campaign chairman, Reg Broomhead, and publicity chairman, Mrs. Alleen Bradley.

A plan for more drivers for people needing treatment was made by Reg Broomhead. He felt perhaps men on shift work could be interested. At present the Society is authorized to pay ten cents a mile to the volunteer drivers.

The meeting concluded with the showing of a film, "The Sword of Hope," which illustrated the work of the Society.

His Busy Season

Guidance Dept. Director Has to Have the Answers



GUIDANCE DIRECTOR ALAN PROUSE

It's the busy season for the Guidance Department of the High School, and its Director Alan Prouse, as the school term nears its end, and Grade 8 and 9 students besiege him with questions regarding their futures.

All through the year, of course, he acts as advisor and father-confessor for students of all grades but at this time it is mostly the younger ones who want the mysteries of High School courses explained.

"Mr. Prouse feels it is his duty to advise only, and insists the onus for the decision must lie with the student and the parent."

Quoting from an Ontario Department of Education circular, he says, "Although guidance services centre on school, and utilize the resources of the whole community, the responsibility for making the decisions regarding occupational choice and education planning must remain with the pupil and his parents."

This should help allay the fears of those parents who feel their freedom of choice may be in danger.

Mr. Prouse stresses that his main aim is to offer explanations, and explain the limitations of each course, so that no student finds the door closing to his chosen vocation simply through ignorance of the requirements.

On entering high school the student may enroll in the commercial, technical or arts and science course. However, there are four and five year courses in each of the three sections. Any five year course, now, may lead to university, but the four year courses are finished at Grade 12.

If the student coming into Grade nine, has not definitely made up his mind upon a course, Mr. Prouse will usually advise them to take the arts and science, in that way all courses are still open to him. However, at the end of grade nine the final decision must be made, since after that, a change back to arts would result in the loss of at least one year.

In addition to actual courses offered, the Guidance Department tries to help with any problems which can hinder a child's progress, socially, academically or emotionally. While that of a private nature, they try to help the student adjust to the school, to the teachers, and the other students.

By a system of aptitude tests and observation of characteristics and ability, they try to point the way to a suitable goal, or several suitable goals.

In the words of the Guidance Branch of Department of Education, "the purpose of school guidance services is to help each student first to understand his own talents and weaknesses, then to acquire skills, knowledge and attitudes that will best develop his talents, and finally to choose, train or enter and progress in an occupational field where he can find the greatest reward in personal satisfaction and the greatest opportunity to contribute to mankind the fruit of his talent."
