Robert Kerr Prominent as
Hackney Horseman, Breeder

One of Ontario's best known
enthusiasts and breeders of hack-
ney horses, Robert Kerr, 30,
died on April 18 at the Geor-
getown Nursing Home.

He was blessed with the good
health to enjoy his business and
hobby of horses almost till the
last. He drove his horses as late
as two years ago at some of the
district fairs. And he was able
to attend last year's fall fair,
though not as a competitor this
time.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. James
Kerr, he was born on the Erin
Township homestead where he
lived all his life. His father was
a horseman also and they de-
veloped the Lady Kerr strain,
exporting horses to western Can-
ada and the States.

He first started on the fall
fair circuit as a teenager at the
May 24th fair at Hillsburgh,
which ceased operating many
years ago. His wife, Laura Mc-
Coll who died in 1907, shared
his interest in horses and com-
peted as a lady driver.

He was one of the early pre-
sidents of the Canadian Hack-
ney Horse Society. He had
been president of both Acton

and Erin fall fairs. He was one
of the founders of the Acton
branch of the United Farmers
of Ontario and a lifelong mem-
ber of Churchill Congregational
(later United) Church where he
served as an elder and sang in
the choir.

Mr. Kerr leaves one son Ar-
chie, three grandchildren, Mrs.
Robert Tyler (Betty) Anne) of
Sind, California, Mrs. Donald
Anderson (Marie) and Robert,
and five great grandchildren.

Rev. Ian Fleming of Geor-
getown conducted the funeral
service on Monday in Churchhill
United Church and interment
followed in Churchhill Cemetery.

As part of the service Mrs.
Emerson Anderson, Mrs. Nor-
man Turner and Mrs. William
Thompson sang as a trio and
Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. Turn-
er, a duet.

Two lifelong friends were
honorary pallbearers, Arthur
Swackhamer and Smith Griffin,
who has just celebrated his
80th birthday. Pallbearers were
James McKeary, William Butler,
Bruce Leitch, Leslie Swackha-
mer, Angus McEachern and
Smith Griffin, Jr.

family in their recent bereave-
ment.
