**HARLEY TO HALTON**

WEEKLY OBSERVATIONS BY DR. HARRY HARLEY, M.P. FOR HALTON

The Budget for the year 1965/66 has been introduced into the House of Commons by the Honourable Walter Gordon, Minister of Finance. The debate on the Budget has begun and by regulation will take six days. I am sure that everyone is aware of the contents of the Budget so there seems to be little to be gained by repetition here.

To review 1964 briefly. A half million new jobs have been created; unemployment has fallen; and our Gross National Product rose almost 9 per cent. Housing units have increased. Our balance of trade and payments with other countries has improved. The 1962/63 fiscal year had a budget deficit of \$602 million, and in the year just ended this has been reduced to \$83 million dollars. Royal Commission on Taxation which was appointed in 1962 is expected now to report in the fall of 1965, and the report is expected to be far-reaching and may cause a complete revision of our tax structure.

The expectations for 1965 are good. Our Gross National Product is expected to rise approximately 7 per cent. There are some features of the Budget that are of particular interest to the County of Halton. These are:

1. Canada Development Corporation — this will allow Canadians to invest in Canadian industries and take part in the growth of Canadian industry.
2. For farmers a rapid write-off of cost of corn storage facilities and permission to deduct amounts spent for clearing land or laying drainage tile.
3. To help in control of water pollution, industries will be allowed to deduct 50 percent of the cost of capital expenditures made by them to prevent such pollution.
4. Amounts paid as annual trade union dues or professional dues may be deducted separately from the standard deduction of \$100.
5. The cost involved in obtaining a licence, franchise, or trade name for business reasons will be deductible and landscaping for business will be deductible.
6. A matter of great interest to me is the proposed study by the Special Committee of Food and Drugs, of which I was Chairman in the last two sessions of Parliament, of the 11 percent Federal Sales Tax on drugs. This will be included in the studies to reduce the cost of drugs.
7. And, of course, the 10 per-

cent reduction in income tax for taxpayers generally.

I have been honoured by being named an official delegate of Canada to the 18th World Health Assembly of the World Health Organization which meets in Geneva, Switzerland, from May 4th, 1965 to May 21st, 1965.

**Defence Contracts Awarded to Varian**

OTTAWA (Special to the Herald) — A Georgetown firm has been awarded two contracts by the Department of Defence Production. It was announced here this week by industry minister C. M. Drury.

Varian Associates of Canada Ltd. will supply electronic tubes, one contract to the value of \$37,288 and the other to the value of \$18,735.

The contracts are among 148 unclassified defence contracts for \$10,000 or more awarded by the department during March. Total value of the contracts is \$21,864,110.

The bidding:

West North East South

The bidding is reasonable although North's overall vulnerability is a bit light. West led the six of diamonds with East playing the queen. Declarer held up his ace until the third round of diamonds. Declarer led a heart, West played low and the jack was played from the dummy.

When this held, declarer led a club, covered by the ten, jack and king. West took the last diamond and led a low club. Declarer won in dummy and continued clubs. West winning West led the heart king, won in dummy by the ace. Here is the position with four cards left to play.

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long pause. South also played low. West won the queen of spades and declarer was dead. The heart queen squeezed declarer. If he discarded the queen of clubs, West's six is good. If he discards the spade, West lead to East's good spade. In fact, declarer discarded the club queen on the defence took a club, a heart and two spades.

Since East-West were using weak no trumps, a count would not reveal whether a West has the ace or queen of spades.
