Defence Contracts Awarded to Varian

OTTAWA: (Special to the Herald) - A Georgetown firm has been swarded two contracts by the Department of Defence Production, it was announced here this week by industry mini ster C. M. Drury.

Lid. will supply electronic tubes, one contract to the value of \$37,286 and the other to the value of \$18,735.

The contracts are amoung 148 unclassified defence contracts for \$10,000 or more awarded by the department during March. Total value of the contracts is \$21,864,110.

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
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
