# Beavers Win Opener Here Against Strong Vikings

Georgetown Rigger Beavers played their first home game of the spring at Municipal Park with the Oshawa Vikings being the visitors and took a 3-0 win.

The local boys were not as powerful as last fall as three of their top players were unavailable. Capt. Trevor Sampson and top scorer Roger Newman were playing in the trial for the Ontario team in Toronto. Bruce Kleinatower is still recovering from a broken ankle sustained during the off-season. Beavers defeated Oshawa 16-0 in their last meeting a year ago but this time the visitors fielded a much more powerful team with some very speedy backs.

Oshawa kicked off downhill but the Beavers came on strong and drove them back into their own half. Although heavily outweighed in the scrums some good work by Corris and Mike Slatter resulted in Beavers getting more than their share of the ball. Lee and Adkinson combined well as the halfbacks to keep the whole backfield moving and Beavers continued to press deep into Oshawa territory.

Oshawa broke out fast on several occasions but some fine defensive play by newcomers Jim Rowland at fullback kept them off the score sheet. Half time came with no score but the local boys were unfortunate not to be at least six points up.

Oshawa started to move and their forwards were very effective, especially in the loose scrums. Sandy Mackenzie got Beavers out of trouble with a long kick and from an offside infringement Beavers were awarded a penalty kick. Les Judge made sure of the 3 points with a fine high kick from about 30 yards out.

After this setback, Oshawa literally hammered their way back down to the Beaver line with some good hard rugby being exhibited on both teams. Just when it appeared that the Vikings were about to go over, Alex Funston gathered in a loose ball on his own goal line and stroked through the Oshawa line with a fine turn of speed and some good side stepping. When it looked as though he might go all the way he was pulled down with a fine tackle from behind on the Oshawa 25 yard line. Beavers kept play in the visitors' half for the remainder of the game and the final score remained 3-0.

Next Sunday Beavers visit Aurora and are sure of another fine game with the locals there. The next home game will be a week come Sunday (May 16th).

# Ask Industries Help in Projected Retarded Shop

Local industries are being asked to help establish a workshop for retarded adults in North Halton. The North Halton Association for the mentally retarded is inviting representatives from industry to a special meeting at the Sunshine School in Huron May 6. It hopes the representatives will agree to supply light factory work for the retarded who will be trained for the tasks and supervised at the workshop. An authority on retarded workshops, Paul Herzen of the Ontario Association for Retarded Children, will address the group. The Sunshine School is limited to children between five and 18 years of age. "When they reach 18 they just come home and sit," said Marvin Christensen, member of the Association. He stated they can be given useful work if a workshop can be set up where "nuisance work" is provided for them to do. They would be paid for the work they do. Oakville and Burlington Associations both have art workshops in the past few years. The North Halton centre would be in Milton, Georgetown and Acton. Mr. Christensen said the Association hopes to set up the workshop and have it ready to operate in September. However, the association is not able to underwrite the cost itself. "A lot depends on whether the community will accept the workshop," he stated. "But we'll press on until it becomes a reality." He explained that a concerted fund raising campaign is planned for the middle of May. About 8,000 flower seed packages are being sent to area residents who will be asked to make a contribution. Proceeds from the "Seeds of Hope" campaign go toward establishing the workshop.
