## 2nd Best in League Dore's 70 Strikeouts

Veteran southpaw Jack Roberts of the Campbellville Merchants captured seven of eight decisions to snare top pitching laurels in the Halton County League for the 1964 season.

According to figures released today, Roberts finished with an .875 won-lost percentage, best in the circuit in that department.

Roberts also led the league in strikeouts with 70, six more than Bernie Dore of Georgetown and teammate Harry Hamilton.

He is rated as the loop's outstanding control artist. His 70 strikeouts came in just 73 and one-third innings and he walked only a dozen batters.

Hamilton and Roberts combined with 17-year-old Dave Heffernan to give the pennant.

winning Merchants the stingiest mound crew in the six-team circuit. The Campbellville staff pitched 225 and one-third innings but gave up just 84 runs, an average of less than four per nine-inning game.

Busiest pitcher in the league was veteran Myke Lynch of the Dundas Merchants. He led the circuit in appearances (20), innings pitched (102), hits allowed (108), decisions (15), losses (10) and complete games (10).

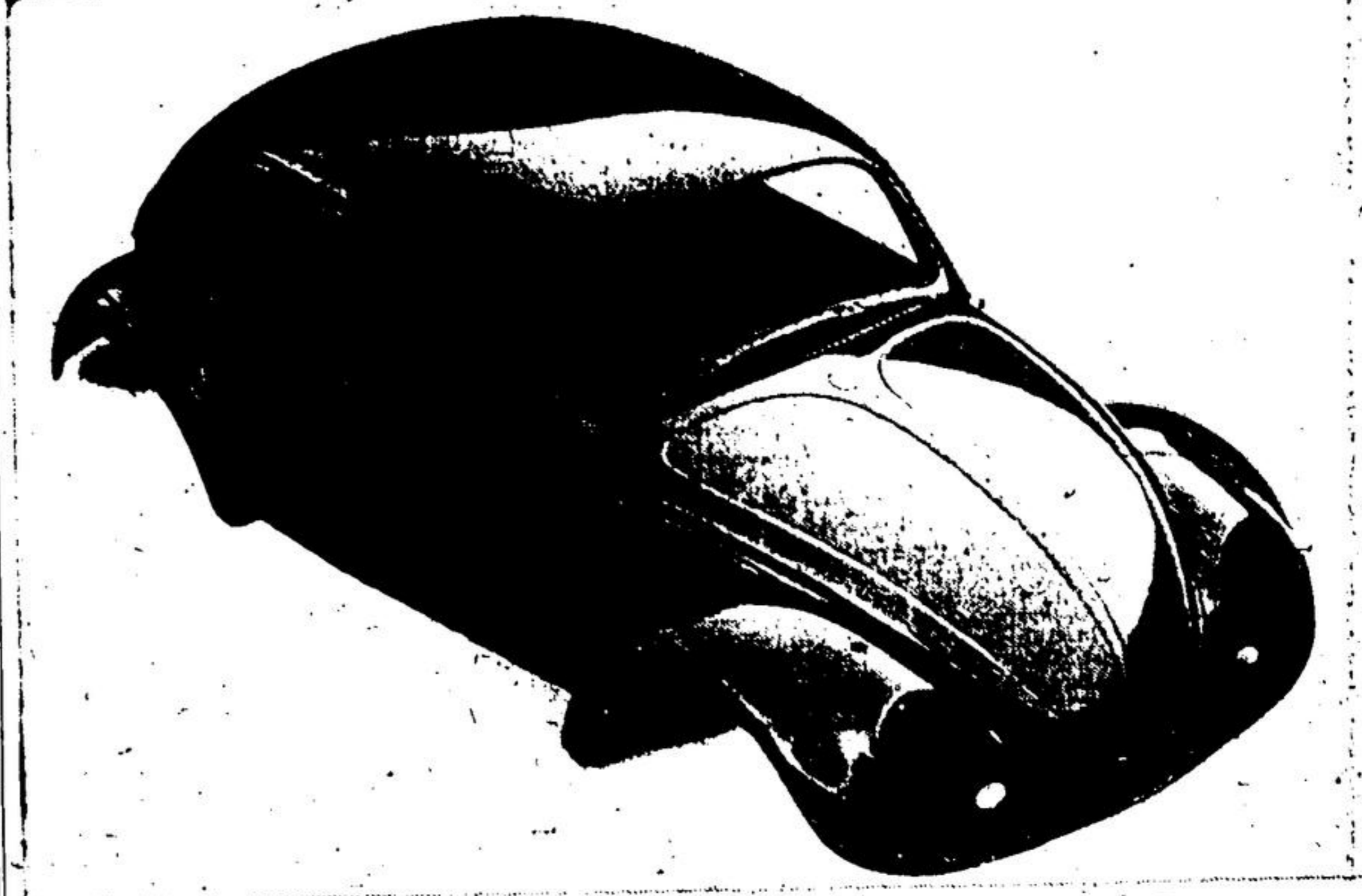
The former Hamilton hurler pitched more innings and was involved in more decisions than the rest of the Dundas mound crew put together.

Hamilton led the circuit in victories with nine (the third highest) and gave up the most walks (54).

## After we paint the car, we paint the paint.

And before we do either to a Volkswagen, we bathe it. We bathe it in steam, we bathe it in alkali, we bathe it in phosphoric. Then we bathe it in a neutralizing solution.
