After-School Matinee and Evening Show for Circus

Two performances, one especially for students, and an evening performance for both adults and children, will be presented by the Gene Cody and Kipling Brothers combined 3-ring circus in the fair grounds Tuesday.

"The afternoon show has a special feature that parents of school age children will like — bus transportation from their school and return for just 10 cents," Lions John Zorge, chairman of the circus committee told The Herald yesterday.

The afternoon show starts at 4:30 and the evening show at 8 o'clock. Parents with children attending the post-school show may have to leave a little later, since the complete show lasts a little under two hours, they can bet none of the kids will complain that they didn't get their money's worth.

Admission prices are 75¢ for pupils and \$1.25 for adults if tickets are purchased in advance — 10¢ more if purchased on circus day.

"We're confident that Circus day in Georgetown will be a big success all around — to audiences, and the club and one of the big selling points is the transportation for school children," John Zorge commented.

"The safety feature of saving the youngsters from crossing busy streets while going to and coming from the fairgrounds we feel is worth the time alone."

"There appears to have been a lot of interest and enthusiasm generated by the circus," he said. "The club members are getting a lot of questions about it and as circus day gets close the advance sales are beginning to accelerate."

"People have not seen a circus like this in Georgetown for a long, long time," Zorge commented. The club, when first considering sponsoring the circus' one-day stand here, had a thorough check and found they had a top notch three-ring show to offer.

There was a smaller circus here last year in the arena, but there is something about the Big Top tent and the sawdust that adds to the excitement and anticipation that accompanies the whole thing."

The Big Top tent can accommodate up to 2,000 people.

It is suggested you go to the fairgrounds at least one hour before show time, so that you may see the many other attractions including the double side show and Menagerie on the Midway.
