GEORGETOWN HIGH SCHOOL CADETS INSPECTED LAST NIGHT

MEMBERS OF THE GEORGETOWN HIGH SCHOOL Cadet Corps, one of the oldest Cadet Corps in Canada, turned out for their annual inspection last night (Wednesday), at the armoury on Park Ave. Some 40 Cadets plus 15 girl Cadets took part in the march past and were reviewed by Lt. Col. John R. Barber, former Lorne Scots Commanding Officer. The program included the march past, precision squad, and rifle, Bren gun and other weapons demonstrations.

New Channel, Dams, Dikes Slated for Glen Williams

Three projects slated for the Credit Valley Conservation Authority for Glen Williams should guarantee the village's river-side residents of less expensive spring thaws in the future.

One of the projects, a channel diversion scheme, is already in process. Tenders were called to alter the Credit river channel at the base of the steep Glen Williams Cemetery cliff where erosion threatens to bring part of the graveyard down into the river if not checked, and the contract awarded to David Barbour and Co. Ltd. of Hillsburgh.

The plan is to create a new channel across the flat valley away from the river bank.

Still in the planning stage is a flood control dam which will be located north east of the 10th Line bridge.

A downstream channel improvement scheme, including dikes to protect residents in the low lying areas, will also be carried out. In conjunction with this will be construction of a new two-lane bridge by Halton County.

The projects are part of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority's modified version of their original Flood Control project which was scuttled earlier this year when the Federal Government announced it would not participate in the financing of the \$4 million dollar plan.

Long range flood control is the thinking behind tree planting which has begun in the Credit River watershed.

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority anticipates that over 400,000 trees will be planted before the season ends under the reforestation assistance program. This includes trees planted on both Authority-owned and private lands. Last year 300,000 trees were planted in the Valley, making a total of more than a million trees planted under CVCA subsidy.

The Authority has planters and men available for machine or hand planting. The cost is

minimal; \$10.00 per thousand for machine planting and \$20.00 per thousand for hand planting. If the owner plants his own trees the CVCA pays a subsidy of \$5.00 per thousand for machine planting and \$10.00 per thousand for hand planting.

Trees of various kinds are obtained direct from the Department of Lands and Forests by the owner for one cent each. Advice from competent foresters is available for everyone on request.

Healthy Production Increase Since D.H.I. Groups Formed

On May 1st, 1964, two Dairy Herd Improvement Associations were organized in Halton County — the Halton East Association, under Frank Chisholm, and the Halton West Association, with George McCormack as Supervisor. In August, 1964, the third Association, the Halton Centre, was organized with Dave Pelletier in charge. These three Associations have been in operation since, with Howard King as Supervisor of the Halton Centre Association.

D.H.I.A. is for grade cattle. The supervisor not only records the milk and butterfat test of each cow in the herd, but the cost of production of the milk on each farm.

During the past ten years, the average production per cow in the three Associations has increased by 1,850 lbs., with pounds of butterfat increased by 66 lbs. The total amount of milk produced per farm has increased from 145,000 to over 250,000 lbs.

During 1963 the average production in each Association was as follows: Halton East — 10,834 lbs; Halton West — 10,640 lbs; and Halton Centre — 10,834 lbs. Cows that are low in milk or fat production are cul-

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Unemployment Picture Better

The Brampton office of the National Unemployment Service placed 324 workers in jobs during April, 1965.

Manufacturing accounted for 143 placements while Trade and Commerce absorbed 121. Construction workers placed were 34 and area farms took 20.

There were 1346 persons registered for employment at the end of the month, down 300 from March 31st.
