## Fluoride for Youngsters MOH Plan for Sept.

Three year olds in the County will have fluoride applied to their teeth in a preventive programme planned by the Halton County Health Unit, starting in September, so Dr. A. H. Bull, told County Council last week.

In presenting his annual report, Dr. Bull explained that a limited programme had been carried out on pre-schoolers, but now it was intended to include three year olds, since it is felt the coating of the teeth is more effective, the younger the child.

According to Dr. Bull, the teeth are first thoroughly cleaned, to assure the penetration of the fluoride, through the outer layer of the teeth, which is tough, makes the enamel more resistant to decay. Maximum benefits are obtained when three applications are made, one at three years, one at four years, and one at five years. The first application at three, is of the most importance.

While the fluoride is applied to the first teeth, the value of the second teeth lies in the proper positioning, making possible more effective self cleaning by the proper grinding and cleaning action of the teeth themselves, when chewing.

Questioned by Milton's Reeve C. A. Martin on whether this would eliminate the necessity of fluoride in the drinking water, Dr. Bull suggested the fluoride in the water gave further protection, and the two together would prevent a great many dental caries.

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## LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

The end play at contract bridge is not too difficult a play for anyone who plays a fair amount of bridge. You just eliminate all the suits that you don't want the defenders to lead, and sit back. In previous columns, I have presented examples of end plays. The hand I wish to show today is a variation on this theme.

In a normal end play, declarer completely eliminates side suits that he does not want led. The variation that I wish to show this week is called a partial strip and end play. Declarer is unable to eliminate all the side suits, but he does the best he can and hopes that the right opponent gets the lead.

This was Board No. 12 and occurred at a regular meeting of the Acton Bridge Club.

The bidding:

The bidding is rather competitive, as it should be in any bridge game. East-West push the opponents to three spades. West leads the diamond ace and declarer plans his defence. It looks like two diamond losers, two trump losers and probably one heart. Down one vulnerable is not too good.

Not much to do on the first trick — West wins and continues a diamond. East wins and shifts to a club. Declarer false cards with the king and leads a trump.

West wins and hoping to set up a club while he still has a trump trick, leads a club.

Now declarer must do what he can. He wins the club in his hand and crosses to dummy with a heart. Now the club ace is cashed and a heart is discarded. Clubs and diamonds have been completely eliminated. Declarer cannot eliminate hearts. He has too many. However, the second high heart is taken.
