

Log Cabin Perfect Setting For R.G. Colonial Shoppe

Colonial furniture is a real colonial log cabin is the unusual setting for the recently opened R. G. Colonial Furniture Shoppe, on Mill Street.

The log cabin, which housed the Walter T. Evans Insurance Co. for twenty years, has been changed very little, with only a large window in the front replacing a smaller one and a partition removed inside.

The log walls, and a large stone fireplace in each room complement the colonial furniture, antique glass, and numerous pioneer day knick-knacks, ranging from a coffee mill, an old fashioned scale with a brass scoop, and a miniature pot bellied stove.

Duelling pistols, and blistles above the fireplaces, the iron pot on the hearth and the cedar jug as a doorknob, recreate a scene from colonial times.

All Canadian made furniture is featured, with most coming from either the Stratford area, or Quebec.

Bob Gougeon, owner of the Robert Gougeon store on Main Street, came to Georgetown from his hometown, Brampton, eleven years ago as an employee of McClure's Furniture Store, long a landmark on Main Street. Four years ago he bought McClure's and it became the present Gougeon Furniture Store.

Is all he has been in the furniture business fifteen years days.

COUNCIL BRIEFS

Council approved the issuance of a taxi driver's license to James H. Ford, 23 McIntyre Creek.

They also approved the erection of a sign at the Robert Gougeon Colonial Shoppe on Mill St., provided it complies with existing by-laws.

The demise of lacrosse in town was noted, when Clerk C. Benham told Council that he tried to forward a notice from the Ontario Lacrosse Association, only to find there was no lacrosse group in town to accept it.

A notice from the Ontario Centennial Planning Branch informed Council that units of the armed forces may be available to help town celebrate their centennial.

\$250 was paid by the town for hockey crests for the Georgetown International Bantam tournament.

The Royal Canadian Legion was granted permission to erect a flagpole on Mill St., and a two foot high picket fence around their property on Market Street in accordance with their request.

The balance of their one mill grant, amounting to \$3,978 was authorized to be paid to the Board of Parks management.

The Earth Boring Co. Ltd. will be hired to bore a hole under No. 7 Hwy. to accommodate a 7" transit pipe and a 1" copper pipe for a distance of 61 ft. at a cost of \$6.50 per foot. This will service a new garage at the Gough St. - Delrex Blvd. corner.

A white painted sign on a post on the front lawn, the same type that hung in front of the early inns, welcomes customers to the Shoppe, but the log cabin itself, and the two friendly fireplaces, manage to outdo the welcome.

Completing the early settlers atmosphere is a framed reminder of working conditions in that time, at least if you worked for Obadiah Smith, Proprietor.
