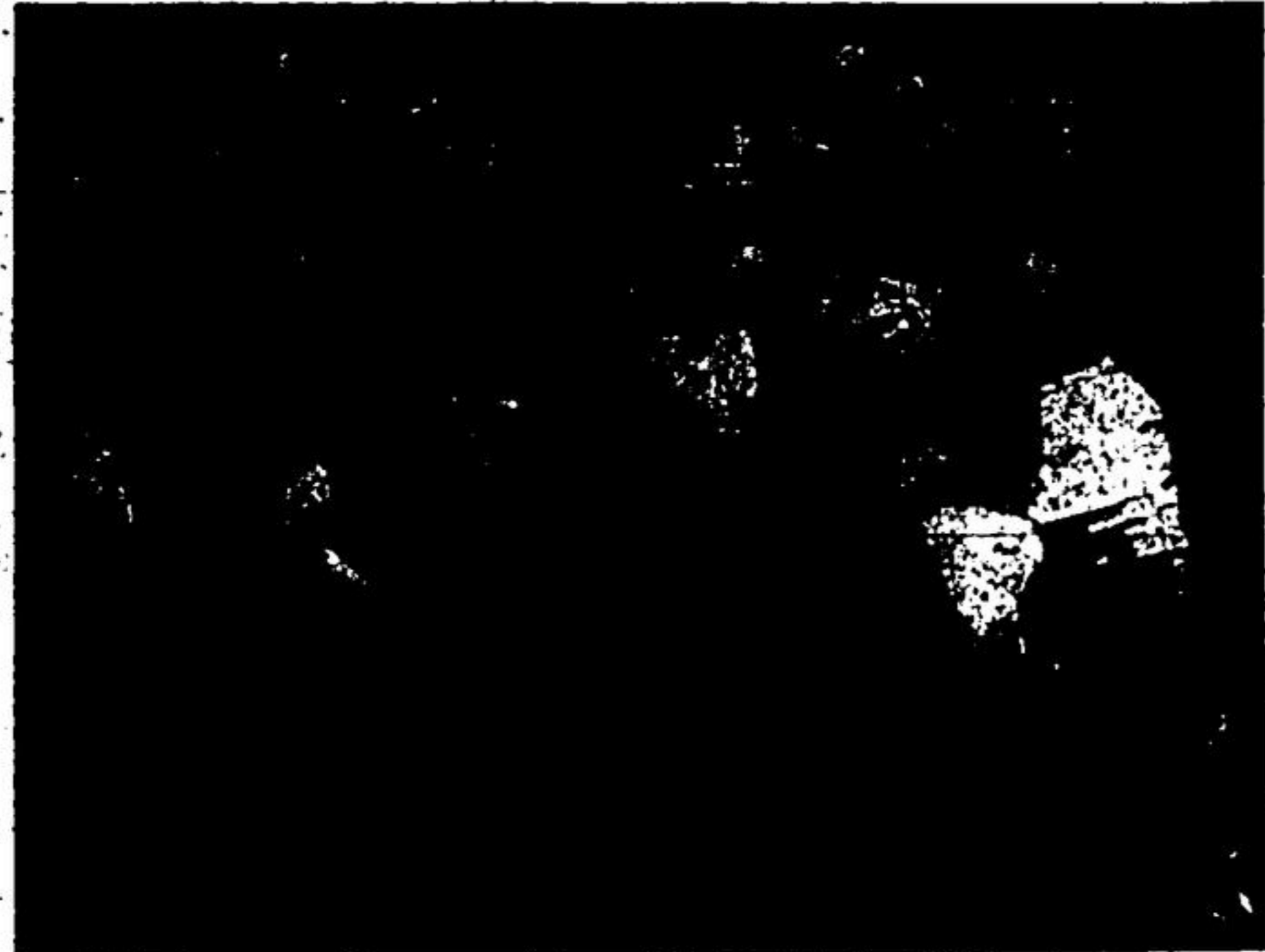


Crippled Beavers Run Over Canucks in Sunday Thriller

One of the finest ruggers games ever played locally took place last Sunday when the Beavers defeated the Toronto Canucks, the team that eliminated them in last year's playoff and beat them 6-5.

Canucks fielded slightly bigger team than last year and they were very strong and fit. Beavers were way below their usual strength as regulars Beecham, Hedfron, Reay, Kienstuber and Hamilton were unavailable, mainly through injuries.

The locals had 3 rookies in the lines including Dave McKenzie, who was playing his last game ever for the Beavers.

Beavers lost the toss and kicked off uphill and against a strong wind. For the first ten minutes or so Beavers kept the Canucks hemmed inside their own 25 yard line and only some good defensive work kept the locals off the scoreboard. Finally, Beavers were awarded a penalty kick when the referee caught a Canuck forward about 5 yards offside. Newcomer Jim Rowland showed his ability as a kicker when he split the uprights with a place kick from

the 30 yard mark and the Beavers went ahead 3-0.

From a lineup on the 25 yard line, a Canuck wing forward was again caught offside and Jim Rowland repeated his act with another perfect kick and Beavers went ahead 6-0 just as the first half ended.

Canucks kicked off in the second half and immediately Beavers went to the offensive. The Blacks had numerous good, thrusting attacks, but seemed to be just unable to get clear of the last defender.

Alex Fumston, Dave Cookwell, Ken Adamson and Sandy Mackenzie all got through but the opposing fullback was in great form and just managed to pull them down at the last instant.

Canucks then moved upfield after a couple of offside calls against overzealous Beaver rookies and after some fine loose play, they finally scored in the corner. The convert at tempt was good and the score narrowed to 6-5. The local boys carried play right down the field after this setback and were soon knocking at the door

again, keeping Canucks tied down in their own end. Beavers looked particularly sharp at this stage and their loose play was very effective with Sanson and Pete Corris being especially prominent. The game ended 6-5.

Pete Corris showed his undeniable superiority at hooker as Beavers got the ball from 21 of 29 set scrums and he turned in another terrific effort in the loose. In seven games between the clubs in the last 2 years, each has won 3 with 1 tied and all scores have been very close.

Next Sunday Beavers are in Montreal for 2 games and the following week will play in Brampton.

Tardy Hunters Will Wait for Gun Licences

Hunters who lose their licenses or would be hunters who haven't yet attained a permit will have to wait until September to get one.

The final gun safety course and examination of the season was Saturday at the Georgetown Anglers and Hunters property north of Georgetown where Department of Lands and Forests instructors Don Hancock, Glen Williams and Ron Challenger of Georgetown okayed nine applicants for licenses.

The nine, 6 from Georgetown and 3 from Acton, included Don Parson, Cliff Nelson, Ray Burrows, Ross Nagorson, Dick Chapman, Bill Davidson, Jim Warr, Dave McMullin, and Bob Bull.

The course, which included lectures, gun handling and written testing, lasted from 10 in the morning until 4 in the afternoon.

The applicants are referred to the local instructors for testing by issuers of hunting licenses in the area.

Anyone not able to produce their expired license when applying for a new one must take the course.

Hockey School Planned for Fall

A hockey school, the first to be operated in Georgetown's Memorial Arena, will be held this fall under the sponsorship of the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group.

The school will operate from October 12th to 22.
