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## Minor Ball Facing Crisis 6th Season May Not Start

The future of Minor Baseball in Georgetown is anything but rosy this week as Minor Ball officials face the problem of coming up with something like 30 men to handle the boys who have signed to play on the organization's 18 teams.

"The situation has become critical," William Korzack, a member of the executive told The Herald Tuesday. "We had hoped to start the minor ball program this week, but I'm afraid the start of the schedule will just have to be postponed until we find some people to coach and umpire — if we get started at all this season."

Two registration days recently attracted close to 300 youngsters. They expect to be playing on the 8 teams in the Tykes League, 6 in Pee-wee, and 4 in Bantam. However, unless the Minor Baseball Association can raise a small army of supervising adults in short order the young baseballers will have to settle for scrub games this summer.

"If we can even get enough men interested to man the benches temporarily maybe we can get underway by next Tuesday," Korzack said. "The most likely source of volunteers is the boys' fathers but if anyone at all would offer to pitch in they would certainly be welcomed."

As always in these productions, many hands were at work back stage.
