Borrowed Bicycle for Errand Norval Cub Didn't Come Home

Tragedy struck on No. 7 Highway at Norval hill Saturday at noon when a truck - bicycle accident claimed the life of 11 year old Jackie Wayne Hamilton, a resident of the village.

The 11-year-old grade five pupil was riding the bike west on the highway to the Delrex Shopping Plaza on an errand when he was hit at the brow of the hill by a panel truck driven by Richard W. Brown, R. R. 2, Norval.

The boy died before the ambulance could rush him to hospital. Jackie had borrowed the bicycle belonging to a friend, Dave Thurbuck, to run the errand.

Ontario Provincial Police were unable to identify the body for some time. People at the scene didn't know the youngster and it wasn't until 3:30, some four and a half hours later, that the O.P.P. called at the Thurbuck Service Station where Mrs. Thurbuck recognized her son's bike.

Jackie's mother, Mrs. Queenie Hamilton, already very anxious since her son had not returned home, was overcome with shock when police notified her of his death.

Jackie leaves four brothers, Jimmie, 13, Danny, 9, Russell, 3 and Kevin, 2 months, and a sister Nancy, 7.

Two GDHS Athletes Qualify For All Ontario Meet Saturday

Georgetown high school will be represented in two events at the All Ontario Track and Field Meet at East York Stadium on Saturday. Mike Cummins, who ran an amazing fast 800 (2 min. flat), and Jan Popiel who topped Georgetown's other first in the Intermediate javelin throw with a shot of 148'7", qualified for the All-Ontario at the CWOSSA 'A' meet last week.

Although represented by an unusually small contingent at the CWOSSA 'A' meet GDHS did well against the winning athletes from various CWOSSA districts.

As well as Popiel and Cummins' showings, Georgetown got good performances from the mile relay team which earned a second place finish with the good time of 3, 04.6. Rupert Bragg-Smith who finished 2nd in the Junior 800, Betty Quackenbush 2nd in the Senior girls shot put and 3rd in the Senior girls discus, Jim Kennebec 2nd in the Junior shot put, and Ross Ann Pedvorse 4th in the Intermediate girls 60 yard event.

These are athletes who progressed from the District 10 CWOSSA Track and Field meet at Guelph which was held one week previous. Official results of this meet have yet to be released, but it's known Georgetown placed third behind the Guelph CVI and John Y. Ross.

Want Elm Street Park Or "Off the Hook"

"Georgetown should get off the hook, and find a way to get out of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority", Mayor J. Gibbons told Council Monday night repeating a statement he had made on other occasions. The question of the Authority arose when notification of the O. M. B. hearing on the Chairman's salary, was given by the mayor.

Reeve J. Elliott felt it was time the Authority took action on the Elm Street green belt. "If it is up to the town to start, they should let us know", he commented. "Nothing is being done for the town", he added.

Deputy Reeve Hunter, the town's representative on the Authority, stated that the prices had been obtained on the land on both sides of Ewing Street. On the north the price was satisfactory, but on the south side to the tracks, the price was high.

Agreeing with the deputy-reeve, Coun. Powers pointed out that the land could not be built on, since it is zoned green belt. He felt it may have to be expropriated eventually. In rebuttal to the mayor who had derided the money spent on Terra Cotta, Coun. Powers

maintained that many local people take advantage of Terra Cotta, rather than driving long distances. "I'd rather the People drove to Georgetown for recreation", the mayor retorted. "We've paid in a hundred thousand dollars to the Authority, and got nothing."

Deputy Reeve too, championed Terra Cotta Conservation Area, saying "It's a wonderful thing", then promised to bring the Elm Street project to the attention of the Credit Valley Authority at their next meeting.

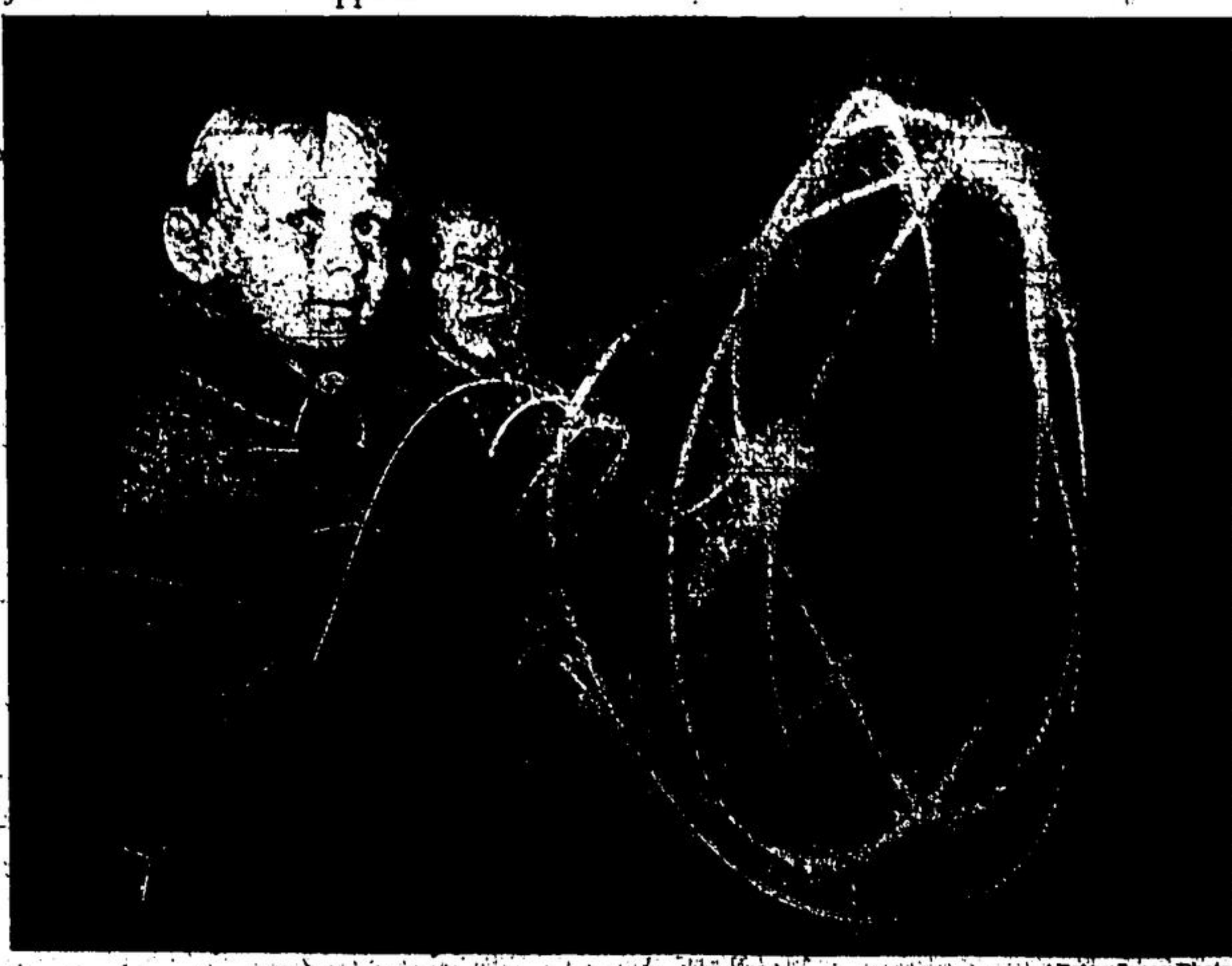
