## Giants Shake Up Merchants With Pitching Duel Upset

It took just one game for the Georgetown Giants to pull off the upset of the year in the Halton County Senior Baseball League.

Playing the Campbellville Merchants, perennial champions, in Georgetown Park Wednesday night the Giants scored twice in the final inning to capture a 2-1 victory in the tight pitching duel between Harry Hamilton, and Georgetown's first string starter, Bernie Dore.

Giants chose the hard way to win it — with two out in the last inning.

Brian McCristall and catcher Don Lindsay both stole home when McCristall shortstop Stu King bobbled an easy roller off the bat of Glen Gibbs. Hamilton had nursed a 1-10 lead from the 3rd inning.

McCristall and Lindsay had gotten on through walks and were advanced to 2nd and 3rd when Jim James, pinchhitting for Bernie Dore, successfully sacrificed.

Merchants could manage just 4 hits of Dore, who struck out 7 and walked just 2.

Campbell put two of their hits together in the 3rd to produce their single run.

## Giants Ratified Air After Copping Second Straight Win

After two games of the Halton County Senior Baseball League schedule Georgetown Giants are sitting in the comfortable but unfamiliar rare air at the top of the standings.

The Giants, who surprised the experts by tripping up Campbellville Merchants in the home opener, made it two in a row Saturday with a 2-1 win over Preston, a new entry in the Halton circuit.

Georgetown sluggers were paced by right fielder Pete Lawson, who went 3 for 4 at the plate, drew a walk, scored once and drove in another run.

George Doucette, the center fielder, was almost as spectacular with 2 hits in 3 trips. He scored twice and led in the RBI department with 2.

Georgetown's other hits were by pitcher Jim Lindsay, 2 for 4, Danny Gibbons, 2 for 3, Tom James and Bill Campbell. Preston outbit the Giants 13 to 11.

Giants got extra base smashes from Pete Lawson, a triple, and Bill Campbell and George Doucette, doubles. All Preston's hits were singles.

Jim Lindsay started on the Hill for the Giants and went 6 and a third frames before being lifted for Bernie Dore who completed the 9. Chuck Howitt and Rick Ortwin, the loser, shared the Preston mound duties.

Giants scored in each of the first five innings and at one time owned a 6-5 lead. They produced 1 run in the 1st, 2 in the 2nd, 1 in the 3rd, and 3 in the 5th. Preston runs came in the 2nd (1), 3rd (2), 5th (1), and 7th (2).

Jim Lindsay gave up 5 runs.

## Parents Responsibility Emphasized During Water Safety Week

This year it is suggested that the promotion for Water Safety Week emphasize the responsibility of the parents.

The number of drownings for Ontario during 1944 totalled 832 — which was a slight decrease from 1943 (843). However, an analysis showed the adults, many of them parents, were responsible for many of the fatalities.

There were 88 children, 12 years and under, unsupervised, that drowned.

Over a hundred adults, between the ages of 22 and 48 drowned. These two figures indicated that adults in the water are not accepting responsibility, not only for their actions, but the action of their children.

There was one drowning in the Georgetown area last season. Nicholas Morfitt, 10, of Toronto, drowned in a swimming area at the Credit Valley Conservation Park, Terra Cotta, on Sunday, June 21st, 1947.

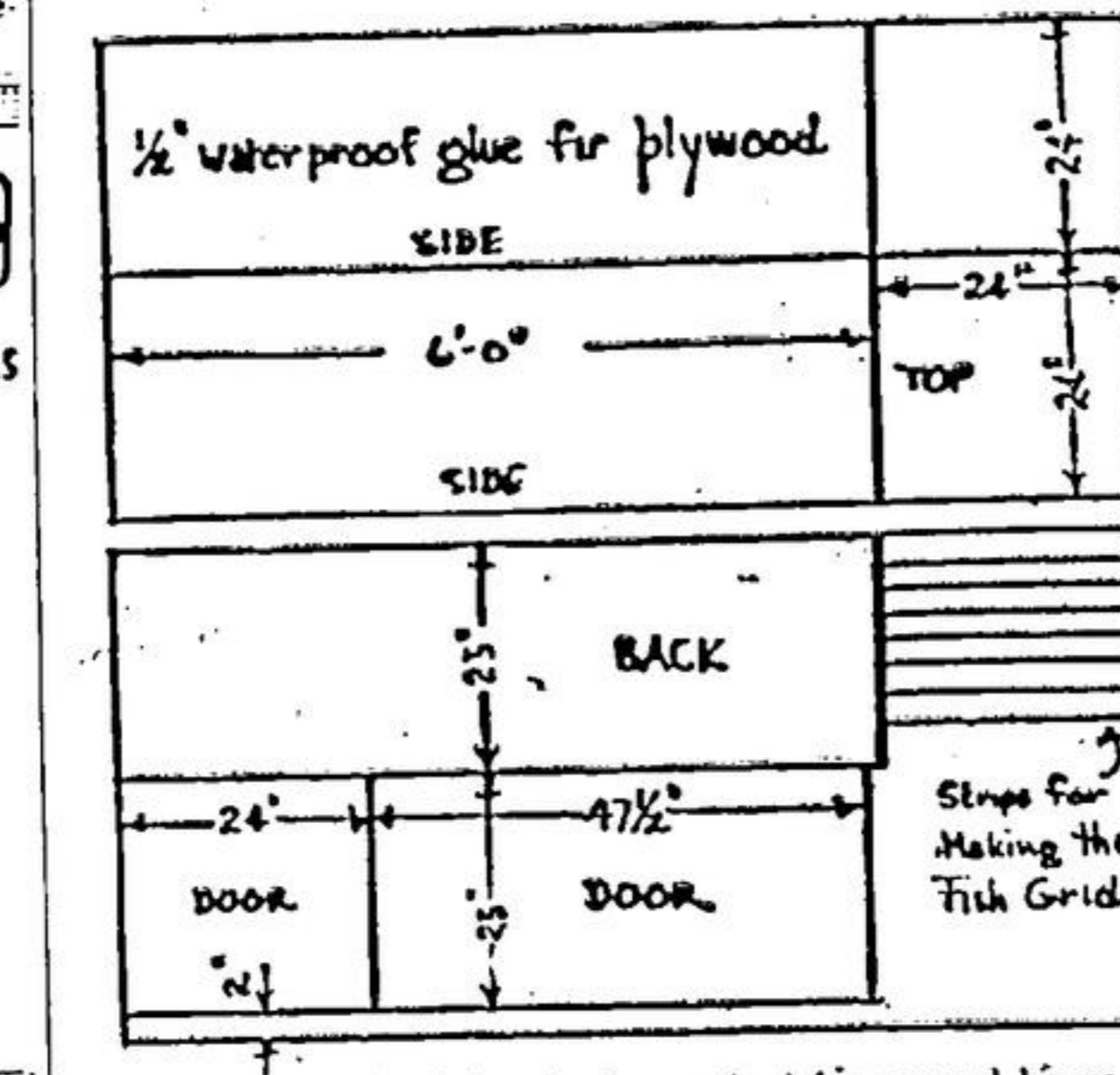
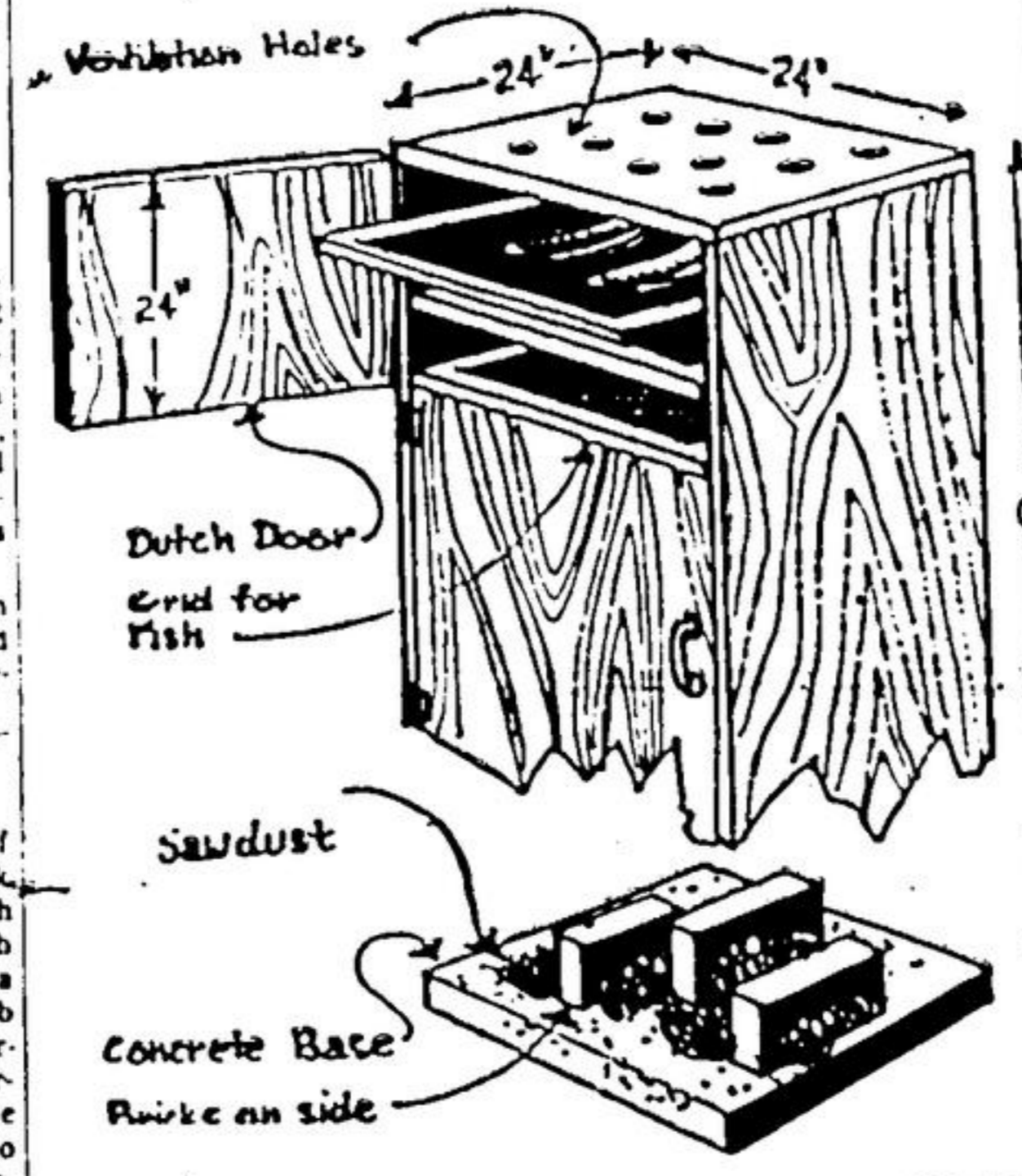
## Mrs. George Muckart Heads Women Bowlers

## Plywood Unit Provides SMOKED FISH FLAVOUR



Fresh caught fish, slowly smoked for several hours in the smoke of a wood fire, are transformed from a simple dish into a rare delicacy. The drawings are self-explanatory and even do-it-yourselfers with a minimum of skill can make a smoker of waterproof glue fir plywood which will last for years.

All the parts can be cut from two 4' x 8' sheets of fir plywood 1/2" thick. Frame work is unnecessary — gluing and nailing are sufficient. Wood stretched across them support the fish in the upper section. The concrete slab base is provided for the fire.

Shavings of oak, alder, hickory, beech or apple give delicate flavour to the fish. But pine, cedar and woods containing resins will not give good results.

To prepare the fish for smoking, open and gut them and remove the head. Soak in a salt solution (4 cups of pure salt, without iodine, in a gallon of water).

Various combinations of volumes of smoke, kind of fuel and temperature of flavors and textures — experiment to get the smoked fish flavour you like best.

## LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

The hand that I am using this week occurred almost two years ago. Occasionally, a hand turns up that has an interesting point to it. I record the hand for a column where I have no regular hand from the Acton Bridge Club.

There are two points of interest in this hand — both defensive. One is an old point, useful to the declarer as well as the defense. The other is strictly defensive and can be summed up as — don't leave something for your partner to do which you can do yourself.

Here is the hand.  
Dealer — North  
Both sides are vulnerable.

North: S-10, H-8, D-10, C-A K Q 7 3  
West: S-A K Q 2, H-10, D-K 9 8 2, C-D 8 5 4  
East: S-D 7 6 5 4, H-6 3, D-A 7 6 5 4, C-2  
South: S-10, H-K Q 8 5 4 2, D-J 3, C-J 10 6

The bidding:  
North: 1 NT Pass  
West: 4 NT Pass  
East: 5 H All Pass

South has a problem over South's jump to four hearts. With the ace-jack of hearts, the strongly suspects that his partner may have strength outside of hearts. North bids four no trump, which is the Blackwood Convention asking for aces. But South has none and says so with his five-club bid. North signs off at five hearts.

I was defending with the West hand and led the spade king. This was primarily so I could get a look at dummy. Now for point number one. Listen to the bidding. Any bid gives both sides information. Notice South's response to Blackwood — no aces. Now I see two aces in dum-
