LIVEN UP THAT BLANK WALL WITH WINDOW BOX

Nothing will brighten a blank wall or add more gaiety to a house front, verandah, patio or shaded corner than a window box, pot or tub filled with bright flowers. These are very intensive sorts of gardens, with little soil and a lot of bloom expected. Therefore the soil must be fine and very rich and there will have to be drainage in the form of coarse gravel or broken pottery in the bottom of each box of hanging pot.

The boxes are usually filled closely with quick and steady flowering things such as pansies, petunias, nasturtiums, ageratum, special foliage plants and for partially shaded positions tuberosus rooted begonias. Some of the flowers should be of a semi-trailing type so that they will overflow and hang down. The boxes, especially made of wood, must be strongly built with the corners preferably reinforced and well supported as they will be heavy when filled with moist soil.
