COUNCIL BRIEFS

Council authorized Town Clerk W. Benham to attend the Clerks and Municipal Finance Officers Convention in Honey Harbour, June 21, 22, and 23, and that all reasonable expenses be paid. An advance of \$125 was allowed.

All six points, where water samples were taken were judged satisfactory by the Halton County Health Unit, council was informed.

A resolution from the city of Hamilton asking the town's backing on an air pollution resolution to be forwarded to the legislature, brought forth this terse comment from Hilda Elliott: "We haven't got enough industry yet, to worry about them polluting the air."

"I'm the cliff-dweller," said Mr. J. Emmerson, as he asked what progress had been made on his road problem. His house on Main St. North very nicely overhangs Ontario St. "The only solution seems to be a retaining wall," commented the mayor.

"You can rest assured, we are still trying to solve your problem," added Coun. Yvanic.

Elliott Wants Plastic Bags For Garbage

The plastic bags for garbage used in other communities was advocated by George J. Elliott at Council meeting Monday night. "They are advantageous to the citizens, since they don't have to be taken back in," he stated.

He felt the town should make them available to the ratepayers as is done in Milton.

He also expressed dissatisfaction with the present garbage contractor. He claimed he has failed to advertise where there was no holiday pickup, as is demanded in the contract, resulting in garbage sitting out on the street.

Council Will Study Development of Town Vacant Lands

A motion sponsored by Cr. Hewson and Smith, to meet as a Committee of the whole to discuss the town's requirements for future development of vacant lands in town passed unanimously Monday night at Council meeting.

Cr. R. Ballentine admitted that he did not know the requirements. "I know what it is in the 1954 agreement, but I think it's time we changed our attitude." All voted for the meeting.
