of land in accordance with the Ontario Weed Control
Act 1960, Sec. 3, 13 and 19, that unless noxious weeds
growing on their lands within the Municipality of
Georgetown are destroyed by date of June 15th, 1965,
and throughout the season, the Municipality may enter
upon said lands, and have the weeds destroyed, charging
the costs against the land in taxes, as set out in the
Act.
Poison Ivy infects many children, and Ragweed is large-
ly responsible for widespread hay-fever suffering. In
the interests of public health, owners are requested
to familiarize themselves with these plants and to de-
stroy them wherever found. Please note that Dandelion
and Golden Rod are not considered to be noxious weeds
under the terms of the Weed Act.

accepted.
