

Highest Honour in Guiding Christina McIntyre Award

A very special event in the life of young Georgetown, took place at St. George's Anglican Church when Ranger Christina McIntyre, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. M. McIntyre, of 8 McIntyre Cres., was presented with her Gold Cord.

The Gold Cord is the highest honour for achievement in Girl Guiding (equivalent to the Queen's Scout badge in Scouting). Christina is a member of the Georgetown Air Ranger Flight, under the leadership of Captain Mrs. Eugene Green and Lt. Carole Lane.

The impressive ceremony opened with the Guide Pledge, followed by prayer and receiving of the colours by Rev. J. G. McMillin, rector of St. George's. Rangers McIntyre then made the Ranger Promise, and the Girl Guide Pledge, each lighting a candle from the taper by Christina which had been lit by her father. Ranger Carol McGilvray read the Scripture lesson.

Following the anthem "They All Call It Canada" by the Rangers, accompanied on the organ by Mr. R. G. Moffat, the presentation of the Gold Cord was made by Division Commissioner Mrs. G. Hills of Glen Williams.

M.P.P. REPORTS TO GEORGETOWN FROM QUEEN'S PARK

I had the pleasure this week at Queen's Park of a visit from our County Warden, Herb Merry, Deputy Reeve Lester Whiting of Oakville, Reeve Carl Martin of Milton and Bill Sargent of Oakville. They are all members of the Halton County Museum Board. The Board wants to have our Museum at Kelso near Milton, designated as the Provincial Agricultural Museum.

Only one museum in Ontario will be so designated and it will qualify our museum for an annual Federal operating grant as well as add a great deal of prestige and status to have it singled out for this honour.

As many in Halton know, the Ontario Steam and Antique Preservers Association hold its annual show at the Milton Fair Grounds each summer. This is the Steam show with lots of hooding and tooting, and draws the "linkers" with their ancient vehicles from all over the continent. There is a possibility that this Association will make Milton its permanent home. There is land available at the Kelso Conservation area near the museum for such a home.

Mr. Stewart pointed out that if the Steam people decided to use the facilities at Kelso for a headquarters it is quite possible that the Halton Museum will be designated as Ontario's official Agricultural Museum. It is not necessary for me

to emphasize the benefit to Halton, the Kelso Conservation Area and the museum if we are so approved by the Provincial Government.

In the meantime, I would suggest that as many people as possible visit the Kelso Conservation Area and call in and look over a valuable collection of old Canadiana. Major Newman, the curator, and his staff are on hand to greet you and to point out and explain all the valuable items on display. The museum is located at the westerly end of the Conservation area and easy to reach from Highway 25 and Highway 401 (McDonald Cartier Freeway). The collection there is most impressive and interesting and is not entirely restricted to agricultural pieces. There is no question but that it is one of the finest in the province.
