Cummins Cracks 2 Min. 880 at All Ontario Track Meet

Georgetown high school track team members Mike Cummins ran the 880 in under 2 minutes for the first time to capture 5th place in that event at the All Ontario Track and Field Meet at East York Stadium Saturday. There were 24 entries. His showing was best of three entries from GDHS. Jan Popiel, who had topped 1st place at the CWSSA meet in Javelin, had an off day and finished well back in the standing, and a relay team of Cummins, Terry Lane, Dave Smallwood, and Jeff Nurse finished 5th in the senior boys relay event entered by 12 teams.

Cummins clocked 1:50 in the 880 but said after that could have bettered his time with a faster first quarter. The winning time was 1:56 by Ray Tucker.

Popiel threw out of bounds twice and slipped on the only delivery that counted in his performance which didn't produce near the distances he has recorded in practice.

The Georgetown relay team was a surprise entry. Track coach Lyn McLaren was called Thursday and asked to bring the team since the CWSSA A qualifiers had cancelled out. They ran in the All Ontario event without any training for a week.

It was the first time Georgetown had sent so many representatives to an All Ontario. The school last made a bid in the meet in 1962 when Dave Brewster qualified for the long jump. He competed again Saturday as a member of a Guelph team.
