The Metropolitan Toronto and Region Transportation Study, operating under authority vested in it by the Province of Ontario, will hold public hearings during the Fall of 1965 in various locations in the region, bounded by the City of Hamilton on the west, the City of Oshawa on the east, and the City of Barrie on the north.

In keeping with its investigation of all modes of land travel in the region leading to a co-ordinated transportation plan of a regional nature for the future, the Study now invites municipalities, other public bodies, organizations and individuals to submit briefs on one or all of the following subjects in their regional context.

1. The type and location of transportation needed in the future.
2. The degree to which transportation availability and flexibility affects economic development and land use.
3. The policies of the different levels of Government needed to resolve transportation problems.

Parties wishing to make submissions are requested to file advance letters of intent before July 15, 1965. The closing date for accepting briefs will be September 30, 1965.

A further notice setting the time and location of the hearings will be published at a later date, and participating parties will be notified officially.
