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Caron (Bill) Bellaghem Was Former District Scout Commissioner

A former District Scout Commissioner and resident of Georgetown, Isaac Caron (Bill) Bellaghem, died on May 19th in the Oakville-Trestalgar Memorial Hospital. Mr. Bellaghem who was born in Caron, Sask., was the son of Gertrude May McMillan and Ernest Bellaghem. He was 51. Mr. Bellaghem served as a sergeant in the Royal Canadian Artillery during the second world war in Canada, the United Kingdom and continental Europe. He was a member of Missions Lodge No. 534, A.M. & A.M., Port Credit Chapter, No. 250, and was a former District Scout Commissioner. While living in Meadsville he served as a school trustee. His wife, the former Kathleen Dawson, whom he married in 1942 in St. John's Anglican Church, Dixie, survives him as do their daughters Trudy Jane and Ariel Eileen. His parents preceded him. Two brothers, Noble Jack Bellaghem, Port Credit and Stanley of Toronto are also left. Prior to coming to Georgetown and after his overseas service, the family lived in Meadsville and Streetsville, moving to Cooksville in 1952 from Georgetown, where he was a member of the staff of the Board of Education of Toronto Township. He was an A. V. Roe employee from 1950 to 1955. Rev. G. Billingsley of St. John's Anglican, Dixie, assisted by Rev. Archdeacon Banks, former rector of that parish, conducted funeral services at the Skinner and Middlebrook Funeral Home, Port Credit, on Saturday, May 22nd. The pallbearers were all nephews, Leigh Bellaghem, Jack Bellaghem, Gordon Bellaghem, William Reid, Fred Dixon and Robert A. Dawson. Honorary pallbearers were William and James Dawson. Interment was in St. John's Anglican Cemetery, Dixie.
