Coun. Hewson pointed out that the engineer had been asked for estimates for storm sewers on Edward Street at the last committee meeting.

"I made a motion some time ago that estimates be given for Edward, Ewing and Park Sts., but only Park has come back," claimed Coun. J. Young. He emphasized that raw sewage was backing up in the Shelley Street basements.
