MAYOR RAPS POLICE AGAIN BUT WON'T BEEF UP FORCE

"How long are we going to operate with seven or eight policemen when we had eleven last year?" asked Reeve Elliott at Monday's council meeting.

"We should have two men directing the police, rather than keep hiring rookies" was the answer of police chairman Mayor Gibbons.

The discussion began when a resident Albert Porter complained that speeding is not being checked in town.

"You've expressed my sentiments exactly" the mayor told him.

Cy. Roy Ballentine rose to the defence of the police force.

"The chief has requested more staff, better communications and better accommodations and we've given him nothing" he said. "How can we expect them to do their jobs properly?"

Cy. Powers said there has been a complete breakdown in communications between council and police since the mayor assumed the police chairmanship January.

"Five months have been elapsed without any progress in the police agreement" he said. Cy. Bill Smith said there are not enough men on the force to use the radar speed check. But he was critical of a recent store break-in when the police had found an empty cash register on the road, but two hours later had still not located the store.

"I know because I saw the smashed window on my way to work, walked through the broken window and reported it to the police" he said.

HARLEY TO HALTON
WEEKLY OBSERVATIONS BY DR. HARRY HARLEY, M.P. FOR HALTON

For the past week debate has continued on the proposed changes in Parliamentary procedure to streamline the work of the House of Commons. It has been very slow progress, with suggested changes in the proposals by the Opposition and counter proposals by the Government. At the present time the troublesome area is the proposed limitation of debate on legislation that would be brought before Parliament for consideration. A business Committee representing all parties would meet and discuss the time to be spent on any one measure. If they agreed their decision would be made an Order of the House of Commons. If the business committee could not agree, the time allowed for debate would be moved by a Minister of the Crown, but could not be less than two days for committee study and one day for third and final reading. If an amendment was proposed, the Speaker would have the authority to allow two extra days of debate. There is no question that this move will limit debate to a given number of speakers and several suggestions have been made to ensure that any Member of Parliament may take part in any debate if he so desires.

The object of the Government is not to limit debate as such but to permit decisions on legislation to be made in a reasonable length of time. This limitation of debate has been used in the United Kingdom for many years with apparent success. Debate has centred around these varying matters the past week and continues.

Royal Assent was given early last evening to the Bill regarding the Senate. Senators over 75 years who are now in the Senate may have the option of retiring on pension now or may continue serving until ill health or death intervenes. Senators appointed in the future will have to retire at the age of 75 years. I certainly agree to this beginning of reform of the Senate.

I am sure the residents of Oakville and Burlington are well aware that the Post Office Department has been investi-

gating mail delivery in the northern areas of both towns. I would appreciate having the the opinion of constituency in these areas as to the present services and any suggestions they have for improving these services. A letter addressed to me, House of Commons, Ottawa, does not require postage, and I would be pleased to hear from my constituents in these areas.
