The umpire ejected the Bramalea player from the game and he later received a three game suspension and a warning for the next time it would be for a year. The inning ended as Coolidge and Sheridan struck out.

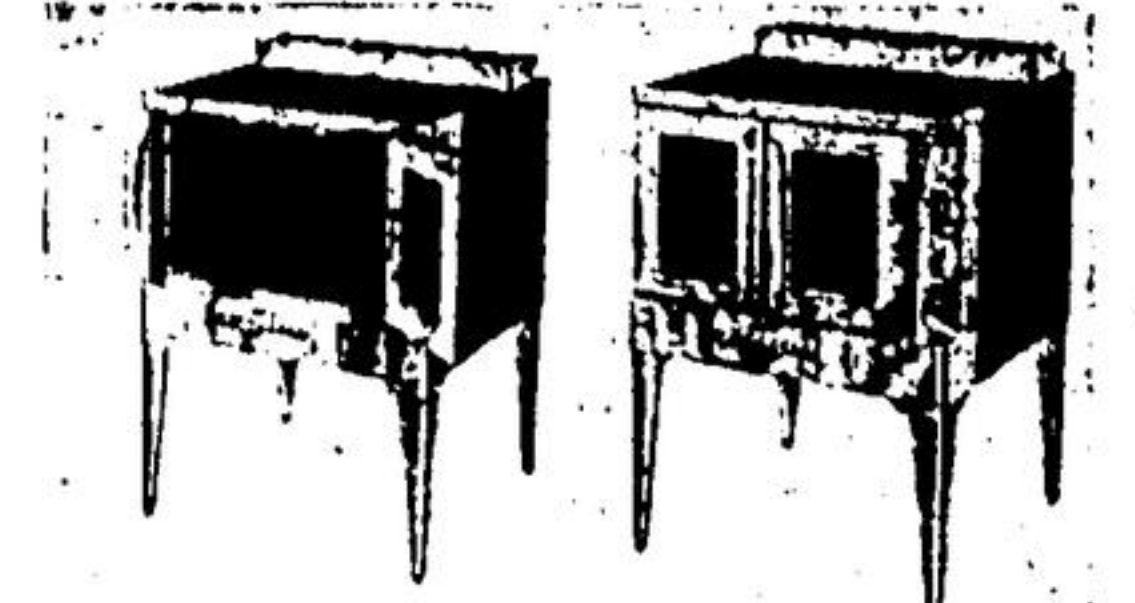
