CANADA'S NEW LABOUR CODE/Lea. Alan MacEachen, Minister of Labour, answers some questions

"Our new Canada Labour Code has been called a 'first', Mr. MacEachen. Would you agree?"

"Briefly, who does this new Code apply to?"

"Let's get down to specifics. What, exactly, does it promise to those employees who are affected by it?"

"Yes, and it is one of the most all-encompassing, Canada has a right to be proud of it. It sets higher standards than have been set for any other country I know. Other countries are taking note of the way Canadian Parliament is covering that more workers share in this country's growth."

"If applied to industries which fall under Federal jurisdiction—and many will prove to be a guide for other industries. The Government itself, which is a large employer in its own right, will take the lead by applying the Code's standards to its own federal employees."

"As we said, it sets minimum standards—and I stress that these are minimum, because, of course, a lot of workers already enjoy higher standards than the Code sets. First, it sets a standard 8 hour day and a 40 hour week, with overtime limited to 8 hours a week, and paid for at time-and-a-half."

Second, it sets the minimum wage rate for all men and women over 17 years of age at \$1.25 an hour.

Next, it provides for two weeks annual vacation with pay, after one year's service; or 4% of wages as vacation pay for those with from 30 days to a year's service.

Finally, it stipulates that each employee shall get eight statutory holidays with pay a year—or get a full day off in lieu of the holiday."

"The Code covers interprovincial or international rail and highway transport, primary fishing where the fisheries work for wages, air transport, radio and TV, shipping, banks, transit, mining, grain elevators, flour and food mills and warehousing, meat cleaning units, interprovincial or international pipelines and ferries, interprovincial or international telegraphs and telephones, most Crown corporations and one or two other smaller industries."
