The ladies were asked to collect their good used clothing for a sale for Toronto. The ladies served a tasty lunch after the meeting.

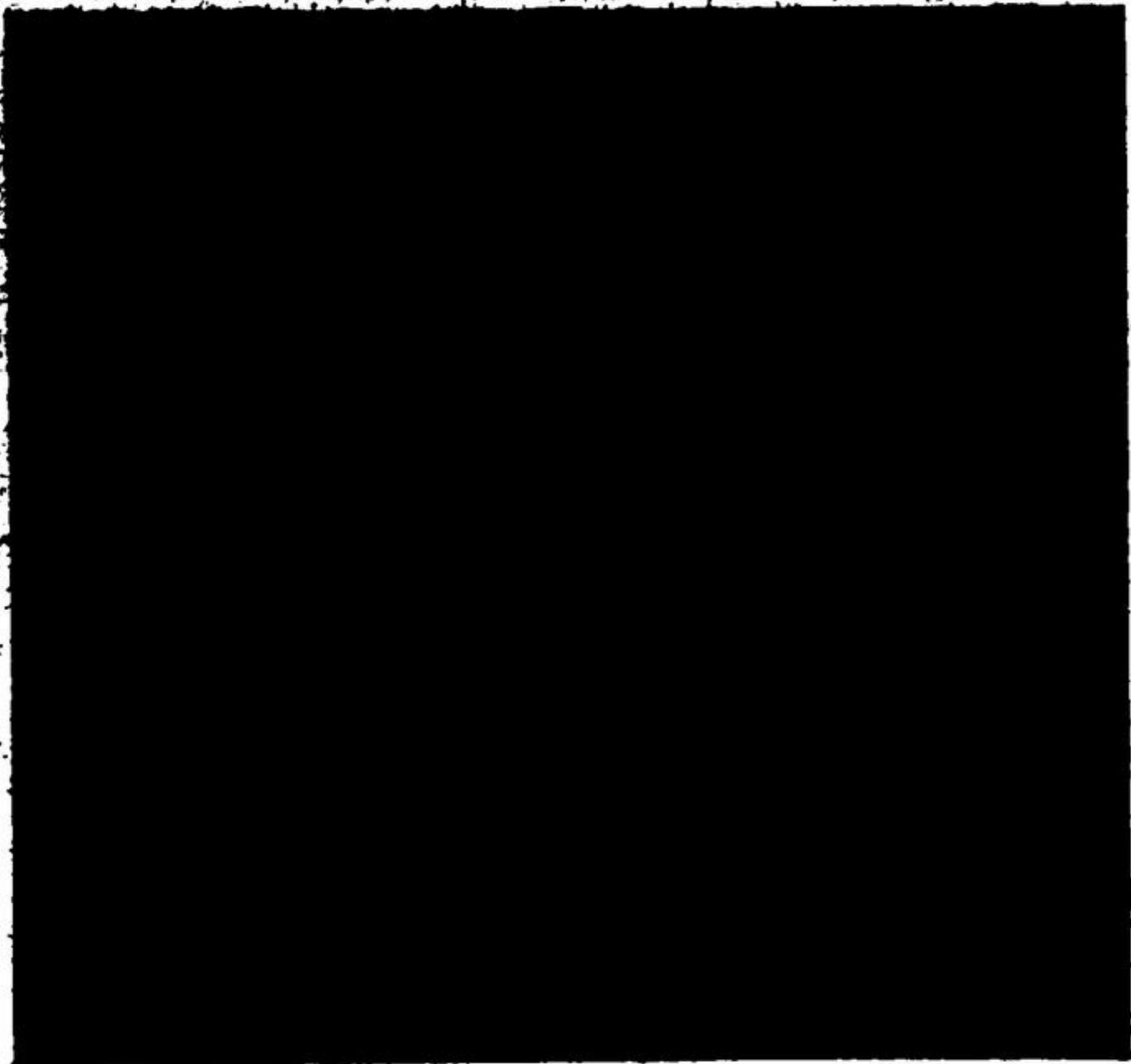
Congratulations to Mr. Bill Cohoon who passed his final year in medicine at Toronto University. He recently returned from a holiday as far as Alaska.
