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Jaycee Bike Rodeo Tests Young Drivers' Skills

With such tests as Weaving, Circling and Making a U Turn in a Narrow Lane, it might have been a course in how to be a Bad Car Driver at the Georgetown Park, Saturday. The tests were three of seven examinations designed to assess the ability of the 125 bicycle riders who turned up at the Georgetown Junior Chamber of Commerce Bike Rodeo.

Other tests for the two wheelers were: Balancing at Slow Speed in which the cyclist had to travel a measured distance between two lines as slowly as possible, Straight Lane Riding in which the cyclists had to negotiate a very narrow runway without touching the guidelines, Riding Between the Stanchions in which the riders had to pilot their bikes over a fence, a course passing through narrow wire gates, and Stopping on a Spot which was just that. In Circling, the riders had to drive a tight circular course without sitting markers, Weaving was a test much like a ski slalom, and U Turning tested the cyclists' ability to make a tight turn.

The Skill Tests commenced at 10 o'clock and continued until shortly after 1 p.m. A quick compiling of points revealed Robert Finnie, 12 of 112 Prince Charles Drive, the Senior Boys winner; Lorna Peardon, 12, of 87 Norton Cres., the Senior
