LET'S PLAY BRIDGE
 BY BILL COATS

An old axiom at contract bridge is "An opening bid opposite an opening bid equals game." This is a good rule to follow and it helps solve a number of bidding problems. I was most surprised to find that others do not know or follow this rule.

The following hand occurred last Monday at the Acton Bridge Club. I was sitting in the South position, and the hand looked like this:

Dealer - West.
 Both sides vulnerable.

North
 S-K 7 4 3
 H-K 7 6 5
 D-K Q 7 4
 C-Q

West East
 S-A 8 S-Q J 9 5 2

North's opening bid is a little on the light side but it is the only way to start describing his hand. South's second try with hearts at the three level was enough to spur North on to a game contract.

This board was played four times but a game contract was only reached once. Every declarer made at least 10 tricks and one made 11.

I had a fairly easy time of it. West led the ace of spades and continued with a spade. This was won in dummy. A trump was led to the queen and the two high diamonds were taken in South's hand. The trump ace was taken. Even if the trump split four - one, declarer can make his contract but things were easy when both defenders had a second trump.

Dummy was entered with the heart king and the queen of clubs was led. The defense won that trick and later scored another trick in spades. Declarer made five heart tricks, four diamonds and one spade.

I am not sure how the bidding went at the other tables. Two declarers played the hand at two hearts. With 13 points in South's hand, South must push on if
