

Would Pay Halton Warden Costs Incurred by Office

An amendment to the Warden's salary by-law, intended to pay all the expenses incurred by the warden in connection with his duties, was held up by Halton County Council last week, when some of the members felt it was too vague.

The payment of expenses would be in addition to the present \$2,500 annual salary already provided.

Deputy Reeve H. D. Young of Nassagawby felt it was too broad a statement, and limitations should be set.

"He could take a trip around the world, without the consent of council," stated Milton's Reeve C. A. Martin, as he went on to claim the by-law was not necessary. "Any warden knows he will be reimbursed for legitimate County expenses," he added.

While praising the Warden's efforts in promoting the County, Deputy Reeve Roy Goodwin of Acton felt, too, that the by-law was wide open, and that the duties should be spelled out.

Heave G. Gallagher of Burlington felt the by-law was necessary to clarify expenses for the Treasurer's office. At present there is no provision for the payment of expenses other than Council or Committee meetings.

Warden H. Merry agreed, and suggested it be clarified for future wardens. He suggested consideration be given to limiting any single expense to \$100, with any cost above that to be approved by the personnel committee. "You can't go to England on that," he quipped.

The by-law was referred back to committee for further study.
