School Pupils Have Tour of Ste. Marie Mission Site

Forty-three pupils from Howard Wrigglesworth Public School toured Ste. Marie Among the Hurons (1632-1649), two miles east of Midland on Highway 12.

Teachers Mrs. E. L. Taylor and Mr. John Fox were in charge of the day-long tour, which included other significant historic sites in the area.

Ste. Marie is the first European community in Ontario and the mission home of six of North America's eight Jesuit martyr saints. Reconstruction, financed by the Ontario government, started a year ago and is expected to be completed in two years.

The Howard Wrigglesworth students saw craftsmen, mostly of French Canadian descent, reconstructing the first barn in the province and the waterway. These craftsmen are employing the precise techniques of seventeenth century construction,

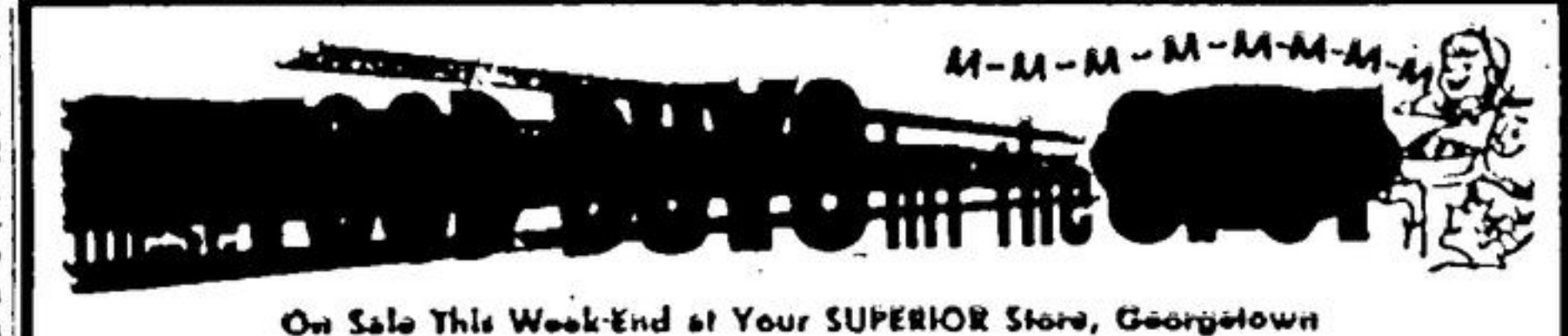
