The draw, sponsored by Men's Section, also provided a prize for the seller of the winning ticket, Jack Kemshead of Glen Williams.

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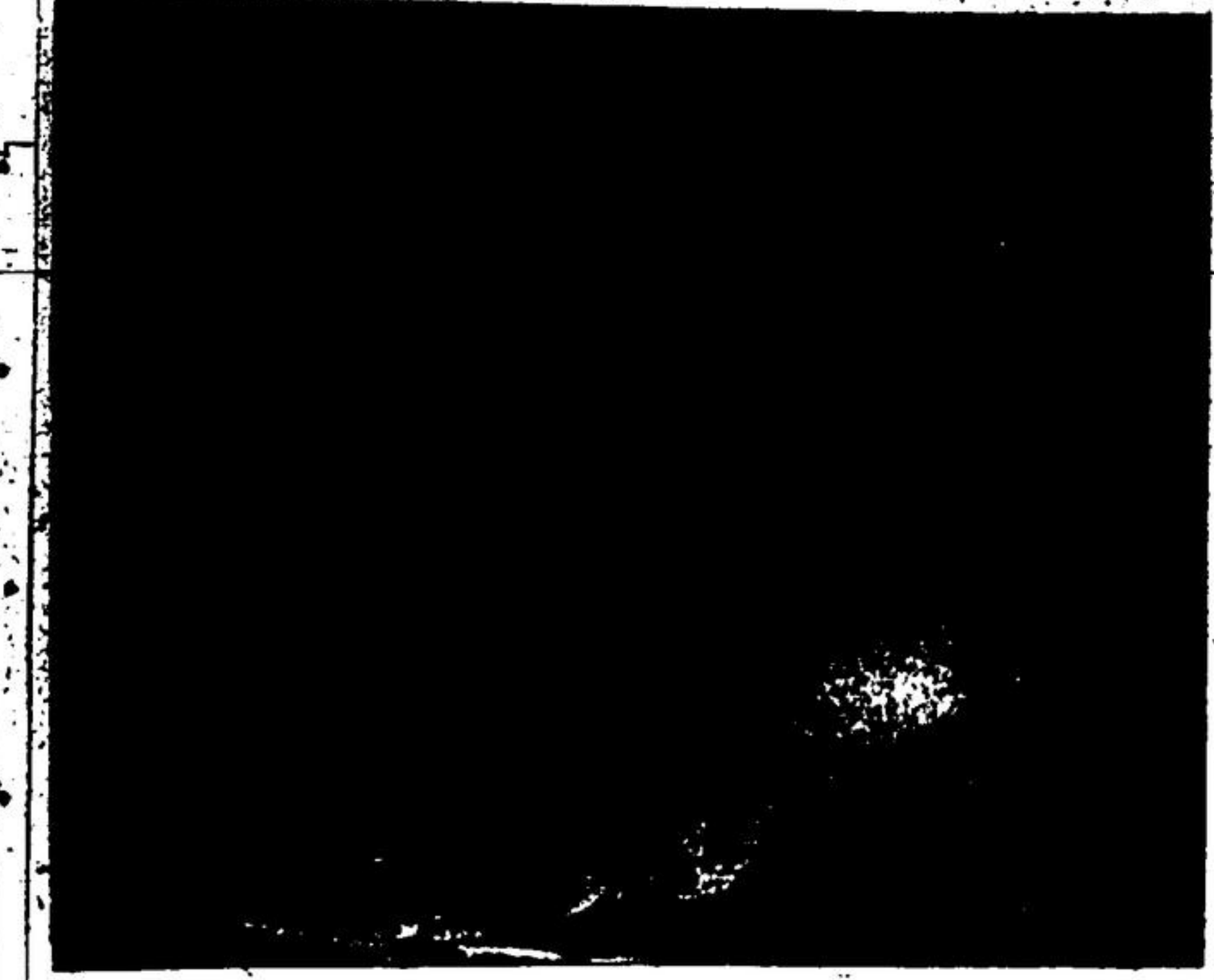

## Boston Coach Pleased With Popiel Acquisition

Boston Bruins Coach Bill Schmidt has been quoted in a Buffalo newspaper as terming his club's acquisition of Georgetown's Paul Popiel as "quite an asset."

In a story by sportswriter Charley Barton Schmidt says, "I like his aggressiveness in every game I saw him play. We may have to curb his aggressiveness at times to cut down his penalties. I feel we can help his skating improve by using him on the forward line."

The Bruins drafted Popiel for the \$30,000 draft prize from Buffalo Bisons during the National Hockey League drafts earlier this month. Buffalo is in the Chicago Black Hawk organization.

Hal Emms, the Bruins new general manager, and Schmidt, made Popiel their second draft choice, after taking goalie Jerry Cheevers from the Rochester Americans.

Emms, in his first season as Boston general manager, became one of Popiel's admirers several years ago when Popiel was playing for St. Catharines Juniors A club. Emms was owner-coach of the Niagara Falls Flyers and often expressed his interest in Popiel.

The 22 year old Popiel learned his minor hockey in the Georgetown Minor Hockey organization. He entered the Black Hawk chain at St. Kitts, played with St. Louis Braves in the Central Pro League where he won the rookie of the year award, before moving up to Buffalo of the American circuit last season.

Popiel was used as both a defenseman and centre with Bisons, but will be given a thorough trial as a forward by the Bruins.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Popiel, Paul lives at 194 Maple Ave. E. and is an A Flight golfer at Georgetown Golf and Country Club.
