Wants Cedarvale Used For "Halfway House"

Georgetown, Ontario June 22, 1965.

Dear Mr. Editor: If our proposed centennial project is worthwhile, how is it that it is taking so long to complete the necessary arrangements to get it underway? Might I suggest that our present centennial project sounds good only because it seems to be the accepted thing to do. Why, every place of importance with a concern for the years following, is entering into some worthwhile project. It appears to me that our present centennial plans have the backing of an overwhelming minority of the people in this town. It may be that it is I who am away out in my thinking but when a large centre such as Toronto cannot obtain sufficient financial backing for a cultural centre because of the lack of interest, then how will Georgetown's soon to be purchased Cedarvale property have the wholehearted support of our people as a cultural centre? I, as a concerned citizen of this town, have seen many dreams fall by the wayside in this town and others because many times "unreasonable politics" warp the true spirit and thought behind the plans of men and women. What I am saying might appear to be unreasonable criticism to you, the reader, but I do believe there is justification for my criticism. How can a town think of a project for purely entertaining itself when there is so much else around us which needs to be corrected before we can truly start to enjoy ourselves? I am not one of those men who pretend to have all the answers, nor do I ever believe I will, but it is time that our young men who have problems with adjusting to our very difficult society had a chance in this particular area to adjust in an encouraging surrounding conducive to rehabilitation rather than uninspiring prison cells. There are many who are thinking right about now that they wouldn't support a project which allows short term-prison youths from the age of 16-21 to live in the middle of the town. Why, it would give this town a bad name, and besides my daughter wouldn't be safe. Oh, you small minded people, let me remind you that if something isn't done soon, the town will not only be unsafe for your daughter but for your whole family in our once-proud community. This past weekend I learned through a very reliable source that it is impossible to give Georgetown that which it already has — a bad name. This very reliable source spends much of his time in our county courthouse dealing with young men who are in trouble with the law. It was he who told me of the very critical criticism in this town, and when learning I was from Georgetown, I apparently must have had a good impression upon him because he said, "I was beginning to think there were no good people in Georgetown."

You who are afraid of Georgetown getting a bad name, think about this for a while for it is your future as well as mine which is in question. And might I make the observation, Georgetown in my opinion is not readily attracting industry, not because we fail to give free land, free taxes for a number of years or any other reasons, but it is because industry is particularly about the kind of reputation its prospective location has. Need I say more? I have written this letter, not because I am sorry to live in this town but because I love this town and its people, and it hurts me deeply to think that here at Cedarvale we have an opportunity to develop a rehabilitation centre (as suggested by our concerned neighbour in Milton) which could grow into one of the most unique centres of its kind in the world. I also realize that our image as a town might be somewhat distorted by various reasons, but when I am continually reminded by outsiders that their impressions of Georgetown are not good, I can't help but think that a project such as previously mentioned must be attempted. Let us, then, use our God-given foresight, rather than sitting back and saying fifty years from now — "We once had a chance to do something for those in the overcrowded jails, but we didn't want to become involved. After all, our Johnny is not in trouble, nor do we expect him to be. We understand him, he has good marks in the school and never thinks of doing wrong."

But can you sit back and proudly call yourself a Canadian knowing that somewhere out in the streets, there walks a boy who didn't come from the usual understanding home-or-one-full-of-opportunities, without doing something about it. Think very seriously what you have read, for the decision you make could have a profound influence on the future life of you and your family in this community.

Further thought, maybe there are other pertinent thoughts in regards to this project. Could it be that Cedarvale might be developed as a school which would train people to go into home- throughout Canada to help to prevent a potential law-breaker? Harvey Handy
