Mackenzie Gets Contract Pineview School Addition

With one man absent, Esqueing Council split on the endorsement of a County Assessment Commissioner, at their Monday night meeting.

Reeve George Leslie and Councillor Walter Linham favoured the County Assessment centralization, but Coun. George Currie and Deputy Reeve Wilfrid Leslie opposed.

Assessor Art Benton assured Council that as far as he knew the present staff would be kept on, if the new system were adopted. The Deputy Reeve felt the township would be losing all control of assessing, while Coun. Currie maintained that it was another step away from local government. "Soon we'll be running to Toronto for everything," he added. He concluded by advising Council to stay on the old system as long as possible.

Council approved the Esqueing School Board's acceptance of two tenders for additions to the Pineview and Limehouse Schools.

J. B. Mackenzie was awarded the contract for the two room addition to Pineview School at a cost of \$38,330 and A. J. McCarthy was awarded the Limehouse contract for another two room addition at a cost of \$42,240.

Delrex Proposal Would Resume House Building

Thursday Open Nights? Says Survey Shows 10 For, 31 Against

Two weeks ago, Jim Buck volunteered to get an opinion from downtown merchants on a proposal to allow Thursday evening shopping hours.

Monday he told Council that he had made a complete canvass and of 37 merchants contacted who would be affected by a by-law change, 31 would retain the present hours, 3 want Thursday nights, and 3 were non-committal.

"With seven merchants in Delrex Market Centre wanting a change this would mean ten for and 31 against Thursday evenings," he summarized.

Cr. Bill Smith observed that the by-law was to have been presented that evening but had not yet been received from the town solicitor.

He queried Mr. Buck's statistics.

"There were at least six stores outside the plaza open Thursday nights," he said, naming Silver's, Cotton's, Jackson's, Maher, American Dress and I. G. A.

Dismiss Charge in Cyclist Fatality

A charge of careless driving laid against a Norval man following the death of 11 year old Jackie Hamilton who was struck while riding a bicycle May 22 was dismissed in magistrate's court Monday.

The 42 year old accused said he couldn't stop his truck when the boy suddenly swerved in front of him on No. 7 Highway on Norval's west hill.

The youngster was killed instantly. The man told the court he first had noticed the boy as the youngster was pumping his bicycle west on the highway.

The man said he couldn't swerve around the boy because he himself was being passed by a car.

The driver of the car stopped looked at the boy and then drove off, he stated.

The accident occurred as the truck overtook the bike on the hill. The boy was standing up pumping his bike when the collision took place.

Offer To Sell Industrial Land To Town In Exchange For Release

A long standing statement which has stalled development of the Delrex subdivision for some years came close to an end Monday.

But it stalled when town council declined to release the former Cleave, Wright and Hepburn farms in a purchase option submitted by Delrex Developments Ltd., which would sell 175 acres of industrial land to Georgetown at \$100 an acre.

The development firm, in turn, said that if the three proposals were dropped, it would only sell 50 acres at this price to the town.

The option was reviewed at a council committee meeting preceding the regular council meeting. It was the culmination of discussions which have been taking place between council, industrial commission and the Delrex firm.

Cr. Jim Young acted for council in the talks. Malcolm Freeman, for the industrial commission and William Sunucks, for the firm.

Margaret Hunter Acclaimed Princess

Margaret Hunter 10, of R. R. 1, Burlington, became Halton County's Dairy Princess for 1945 Friday by acclamation.

County Dairy Field Man Glen White, said this week that Miss Hunter was the only entry in the competition before the Friday deadline.

Margaret Hunter's sister Marion, was chosen winner of the Dairy Princess competition in 1942.

Miss Hunter, a member of 3 county 4H clubs, has just completed her first year in Kempsville Agricultural School near Ottawa where she is taking a home economics course.

She is a member of the Holstein calf club, the grain club, and the conservation club.

The new Dairy Princess will be crowned July 17 at the Hornby Garden Party, the day the judging had been scheduled for.

The purchase option was reviewed at the committee meeting. Several changes were made all of which seemed acceptable to the Delrex firm, except for the drop in development acreage.

In the plan, Delrex agreed to provide paved roadways, sidewalks, sanitary and storm sewers, watermains, street signs, curbs and gutters.

No building permits would be issued until underground services and graded road base is supplied abutting the lots.

The town would agree to certain building stipulations for industrial construction on the acreage decided to the town. And gravel pits and service stations would not be allowed on the purchased property.

At the meeting Mayor Gibbons expressed concern that the agreement would mean a costly addition to the sewage disposal plant. But Cr. Don Powers claimed that the Water Resource Commission has given assurance that the present plant will handle all existing land in the town.

The mayor said unrestricted house building would depreciate existing houses in the area.

"I feel it's a matter of 'get the industry' and if we had even one substantial industry

coming I might be inclined to go for this," he said.

He suggested the committee sit in with the firm and town solicitors again and come back with more facts.

"We've discussed this with the developer. There's no use going back unless we can tell him what council wants," said Cr. Young, urging members to state their views.

Mayor Gibbons said the town should first have a standard housing by-law so any future building would not be detrimental to present structures.

"This land is registered and zoned," replied Cr. Young. "There is very little R-4 in it."

The committee meeting ended at this point as it was time to start the regular council meeting.

Later, Cr. Young again pressed council to take some action. He urged council to decide on what changes it would require in the option submitted and send it back to the Delrex firm for consideration.

His only reply came from the mayor.

"I would rather refer it back for further study by the committee, town solicitor and Mr. Heslop," he said.

High Scouting Honour For Mrs. C. E. Collis

A woman who assisted in starting Scouting and Girl Guides organizations in Norval in the 40s, and also assisted in the formation and training of groups at Hornby, will receive the Order of the Silver Acorn from Canada's Governor General George P. Vanier.

Mrs. C. E. Collis, now a Brampton mother, will be presented with this high Scouting honour at a special ceremony in Ottawa, October 20th.

Mrs. Collis, who has devoted over 30 years to Scouting first became interested in it when

her son James, now a photographer in Newmarket, was a member of the 1st Peterboro Cub pack in 1935.

She has passed the Gilwell badge course, and holds the St. John Ambulance gold medalion, passing her fourth bar examination in December 1964.

Mrs. Collis is a former District Cubmaster for the Peel District and was Cubmaster for the 4th Brampton pack from 1951 to 1953.

In 1952 she was one of nine representatives from Canada at the first International Leaders Conference in England. She was awarded a long service medal in 1952, and in 1953 was on the staff for the World Scouting Jamboree held at Niagara-on-the-Lake.
