Second Hay Crop Gets Benefit from Rainfall

The rain which covered the county unevenly last week, will boost the growth of pasture and the second hay crop in north Halton.

Halton's dairy fieldman Glen E. White said the county's pasture and hay crop yield were being affected by the drought which has hit most parts of Ontario.

The rain will induce better pasture growth and increase farmers' chances of taking in a second crop of hay later this summer, he said.

Farmers in Halton had stated earlier they feared the total loss of a second hay cutting this year. Pastures were not growing either.

Henry Stanley, county agricultural representative, said drought conditions still prevail in the south half of the county since it didn't receive much rainfall.

He stated that two-thirds of an inch of rain fell in this area. South Halton didn't receive this much, he said, in the storm that seemed to hit only the upper part of the county.

"I don't think it did much good as all in the south half," he noted, "There is no change in the drought there as far as I know."

Mr. White said the rain in the upper half of the county will help germinate some of the grains resting unchanged in the ground since being sown the first week of May.

Germination has been spotty in most of Halton's fields because of the rain shortage, he said.
