

Local Invention, Hose Caddy Goes on Sale Across Ontario

A Georgetown man and two Brampton men have combined with a mind to becoming inventors — and in fact have already produced their first brain-child.

Stanley H. Moore, 26 Stevens Crescent, a welder and utility man. Roy Polos, Brampton, a tool and die maker, and Richard Evans, Brampton, a technical designer machinist and millwright, are keeping a hopeful eye on the sales of their EZY-ON Hose Caddy, a device for storing a garden hose without discharging from the outdoor faucet.

The unit, which is mounted in seconds with a screwdriver, is being sold locally and across

the province and its producers hope to start it on the American market next year.

Mr. Moore, who has come up with some ideas for inventions at his place of employment, one of which has been in use there for the past two years, has been interested in inventing for some time.

"It has always been my hobby and my partners to think of new ways of doing things and to simplify existing systems," Mr. Moore told The Herald. "In fact this is what drew us together."

The trio joined forces in August of 1964 and sent searches to patent offices in September

(Canadian and US). In November they applied for a patent for their EZY-ON Hose Caddy and a month later had rented quarters at 8 Young St. where they developed a form machine to produce the product.

The hose was ready to market in late April.

"A quitter never wins and a winner never quits," Mr. Moore said in explaining the perseverance required by an inventor. "We have several other ideas, one of which is being searched at the patent office in Washington D. C. at present and we are expecting word anytime on it," he said.

"Our life's goal is to be inventors, and we feel it's possible to be successful at it," Mr. Moore said. "You have to want something enough to really go after it."

Mr. Moore said he has faith in the town, in his partners' abilities and his own, explaining, "we feel the town will become a large industrial centre and we hope to be part of it."

Mr. Moore said the product which is currently awaiting a patent has "world wide potential" if it is accepted.

"Part of an inventor's worth is his ability to simplify the complicated," Mr. Moore said. "By this I mean that most people do not take an idea far enough. Every idea starts out as a complicated thing. You have to simplify it, and then simplify it again. Like in mathematics, bring it to its lowest common denominator."

"Ideas, like life, can only be enjoyed through simplicity," said Mr. Moore, who likes to spout philosophy almost as much as he likes to invent.

"There is more gold mined from the minds of men than ever taken from the earth," he added quoting an anonymous historian.

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Province Refuses Extra Grants, Regional Jail

The regional jail committee, set up to provide a new jail for Halton and Wentworth Counties as well as the City of Hamilton, was turned last week when it asked for extra grants.

The committee visited the office of the Minister of Reform Institutions, Allan Grossman.

Reeve William Coulter said: "The minister pointed out the province had already done as much as it could."

The province was prepared to pay 50 per cent of the building cost, but the committee wanted a 50 per cent grant on acquisition of land and on servicing the site.

The committee also asked the minister to increase the 10 per cent maintenance grant to

50 per cent. This request was also turned down.

The present facilities of the county jail were called a disgrace in a recent grand jury report.

Halton County Warden Herbert C. Merry has referred to the jail as an archaic building which needs to be replaced.

The regional jail would provide rehabilitation programs for prisoners and special personnel and consultants would have offices within the jail.

Special offices for the clergy, psychiatrists and counsellors would be contained in the building.

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
