**Dr. Frederick Hutt Retires
Becomes Professor Emeritus**

A Cornell University professor whose father, the late Professor H. L. Hutt, was a well known Georgetown man, and whose brother and sister Gordon and Miss Jean Hutt are still residents here, became professor emeritus on his retirement June 30.

Professor Frederick H. Hutt of the department of poultry husbandry New York State College of Agriculture, has several credits to his credit. He taught the first course in human heredity at Cornell, and organized and directed the first inter-departmental seminar on animal genetics. In 1946 he taught students in the NY State Veterinary College the first course in genetics designed especially for prospective veterinarians, and has given the course since that time.

Contributed more
According to his co-workers his research on genetics of the fowl has contributed more to the present understanding of sex-linked genes than that of any other researcher. He was first to construct a chromosome map of the fowl, and has contributed much to the present knowledge of mutations and breed characteristics.

He has provided experimental evidence of the role heredity plays in resistance to disease in animals and its value in controlling leucosis and pulmonary in chickens. He has also studied and reported on hereditary defects in cattle, dogs and man.

Professor Hutt received the B. S. A. degree from the Ontario Agricultural College (then a faculty of the University of Toronto), the M. S. degree from the University of Wisconsin, the M. A. degree in zoology from the University of Manitoba, and the Ph. D. and D. S. degrees in genetics from the University of Edinburgh.

Three Awards
He was lecturer at the University of Manitoba and extension poultryman in the Manitoba Department of Agriculture 1923-27. After his return from Edinburgh in 1928, he joined the staff at the University of

**Three Collisions Bring
Damage to 6 Vehicles**

A cleaning truck and a car collided opposite 41 Albert St. Saturday July 3 resulting in an estimated \$450 damage. The truck, a 1963 Chevrolet panel owned by Town and Country Cleaners and driven by Leroy Young, Huttonville, was north bound on Albert when it collided with a 1960 Vauxhall driven by Larry Richard Hawes, 1 King St. E.

Police said the Hawes car was entering Albert Street from a private drive.

Cpl Ted Scott placed property damage at \$200 to the truck and \$250 to the car.

Two cars came together opposite 2 John St. E. resulting in \$125 in property damage to the vehicles. H. Smith, 2 Victoria Cres., was backing a 1961 Dodge out of a private drive when it collided with a 1964 Chevy driven by Joseph Wheatley, Chinguacousy. The Wheatley car was travelling south on John approaching the CN subway.

Cars driven by Knute Keire, 41 Queen St. Rosa Lewis, 34 Weber St. and Thomas Nixon, R. R. 3, Streetsville, were involved at the Guelph Mountainview Road intersection.

The Keire car, a 1964 Volkswagen, was southbound on Mountainview crossing Guelph, the Lewis car, a 1962 Meteor, was travelling east on the highway, and the Nixon vehicle, a 1961 Comet, was stopped on Mountainview facing north.

The Lewis car swerved after colliding with the Volkswagen and struck the stopped Nixon car according to a police report. The damage was approximately \$800.
