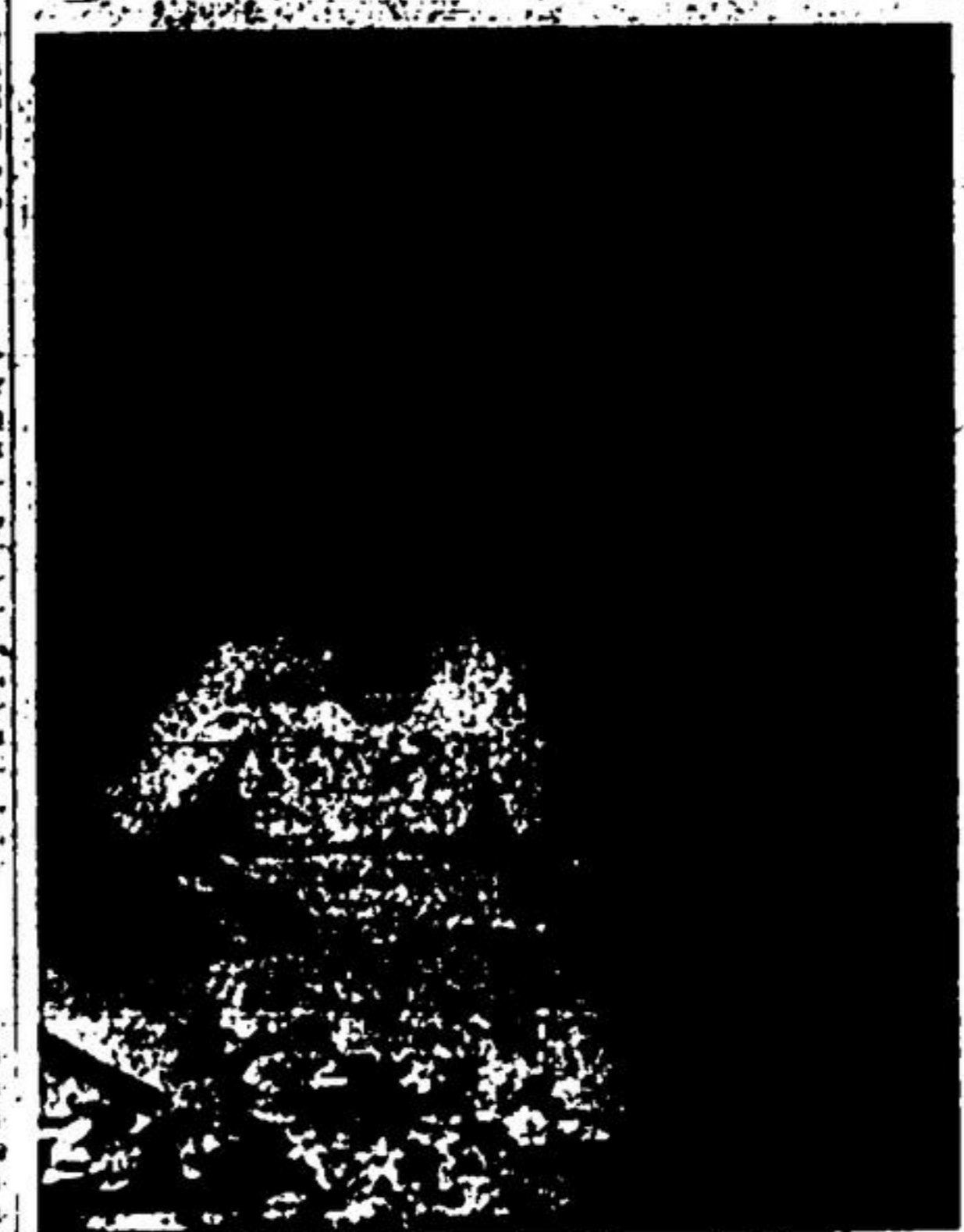

Centralized Assessment is Carried, Close Council Vote

A close vote by Council Wednesday night endorsing the appointment of a County Assessment Commissioner and a centralized assessment office, put the County Council representatives Reeve Elliott and Deputy Reeve W. Hunter in the unusual position of opposing the motion personally, but objecting their vote for it at County Council, since the local council approved it five to four.

The mayor felt that all control of the assessing department would be taken out of the town's hands, and would take away the personal touch between ratepayer and assessor. He praised the present County assessor Ford Rogers highly for his efforts in bringing equalized assessment to Halton County.

Coun. Don Powers countered by saying the council had no control of the assessment department anyway. He felt centralized assessing was the trend and would come eventually anyway.

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Police Help to Revive Terra Cotta Woman
Mrs. Herman Carrier of Terra Cotta was taken to hospital last week after being discovered unconscious on the floor of her cottage.
She was reported resting comfortably in Peel Memorial Hospital because of the co-operation of Chief William Martin of the Chinguacousy fire department and off-duty OPP constable George Raman.
