It was generally deeided that all groups should get together and try and fron out their problems.

On May 3rd, 1981, a meeting was held at the realdence of Bill Richmond, and in attendance were Scotty Patterson, Hill Fisher, Myles Gilson, of the Intermediates, Bult Richmond, Tracy Barrager, Phil Poyntz of the Midgets, Bill Smith, Norm Macklem from the Minors.
