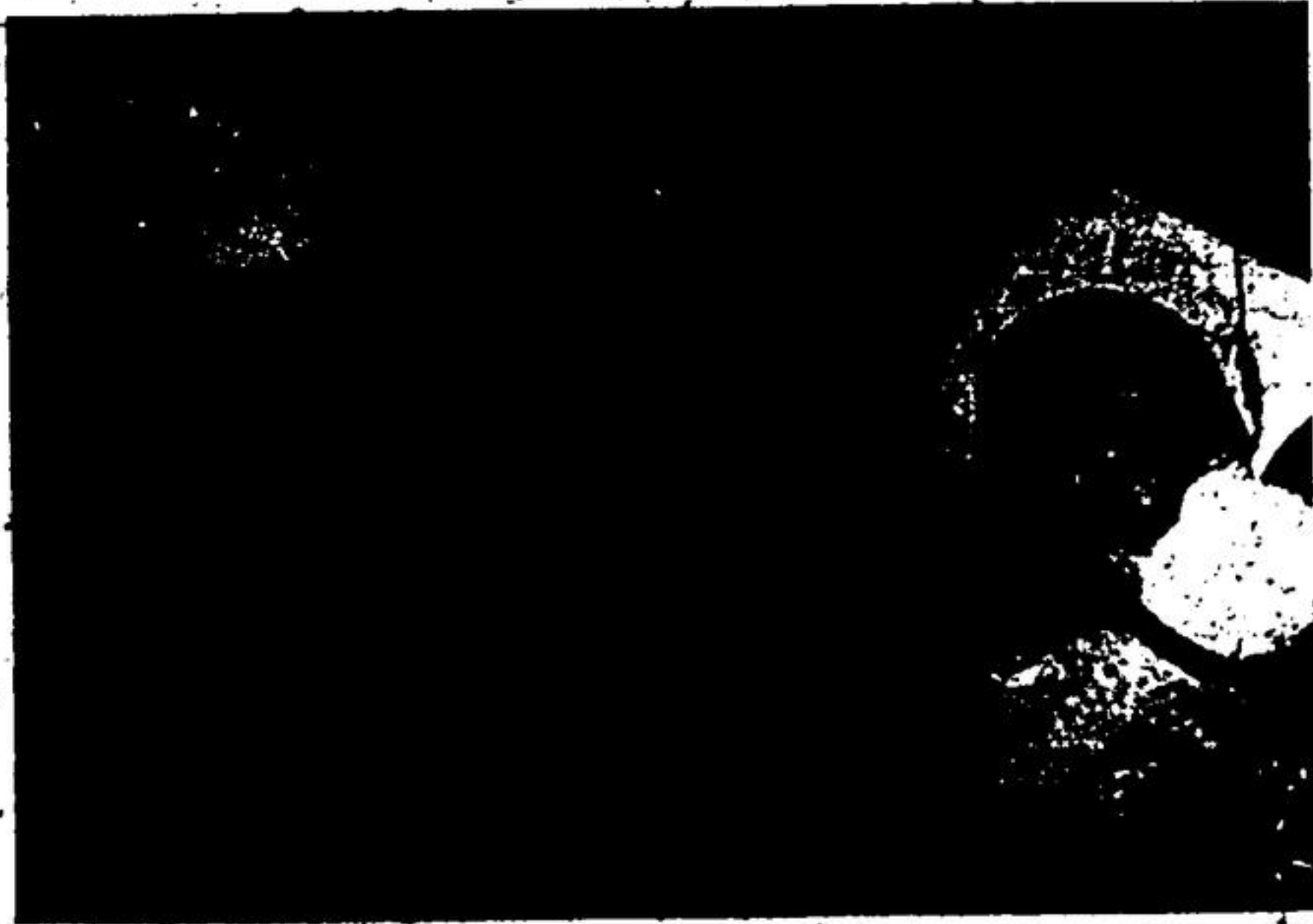


Do It Yourself Grads Make Their Own Mortarboards

Quebec Jamboree Highlight For Scouts From Ontario

The Ontario contingent to the Quebec Jamboree was made up of two groups, Niagara Region and Green Acres Region. Out of these two regions came 35 boys and 3 leaders, some from as far away as Niagara, Tillsburg, Jarvis, Welland, Fort Erie, Port Colborne and York.

The Delrex Market Centre, Georgetown, was the departure point for the Ontario Scouts and on July 2nd the party boarded a bus at about 9.15 a.m. to start for the annual assemblage of Quebec Scouts near Drummondville.

Sleep At L.C.C.

We travelled along No. 7 Hwy. to No. 27 and then south to the Macdonald - Cartier Freeway. We made a stop for lunch in Port Hope, but we were soon back on the Freeway and approaching the Quebec border. At the provincial border we switched to Hwy. No. 9 which took us into Montreal. We had supper in the city and then went to Lower Canada College gymnasium where we were given sleeping quarters.

After breakfast the next day, which was Saturday, we were taken to downtown Montreal and turned loose until about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. We regrouped and boarded the bus and proceeded to a point about 3 miles past Drummondville — the Jamboree site.

By 9 p.m. we had set up the camp and an hour later all the Ontario visitors were in for the night.

Change Neckerschief

Next morning, ten people were up at 6 o'clock to draw rations. After breakfast, a work party went out to cut wood for the gate. That afternoon the Jamboree was officially opened by the Lt. Governor of Quebec. At this ceremony the Scouts changed their group neckerschiefs for the official Jamboree neckerschief.

Monday morning's program included flag breaking, log raising, flag pole raising, a chariot race and monkey bridge building. The afternoon was free time. Tuesday followed much the same pattern, and Wednesday was all free-time with swimming attracting Scouts.

Obstacle Course — Relays

An obstacle course highlighted Thursday's program. This was basically a test of strength, agility and speed. A 10-foot ladder has to be travelled along hand over hand, then over crooked logs, a 15 ft. wall, two large steps down, through a tunnel, over a pipe wall, swing over a deep hole and scramble

through rubber tires to the finish line.

The Ontario contingent made a general clean-up of their camp site Friday morning until 9.45 when we proceeded for the game field. Here a series were run, log chopping, tent peg relay, log sawing and fire building. The Jamboree was officially closed Friday evening and a big camp fire followed.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Nixon and Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Nixon left last Wednesday on a motor trip to the West Coast.

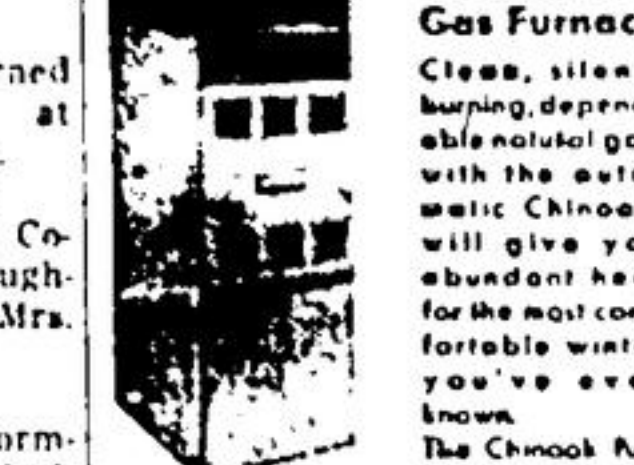

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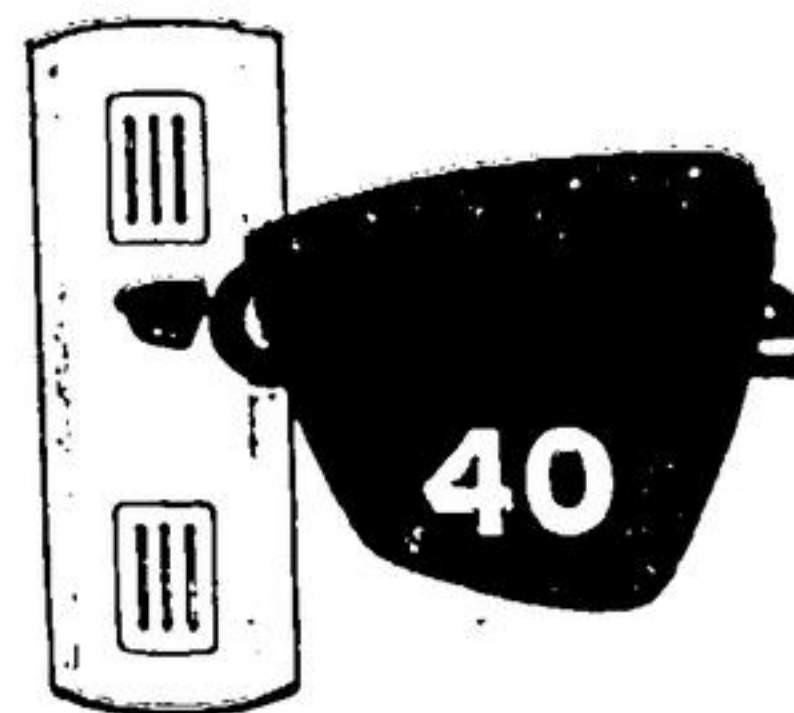
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
